1: Important Days



National Doctor's Day (India) : 01 July :-

National Doctor's Day in India is observed every year on July 1 to honor the invaluable contributions of doctors and medical professionals in the country. This day commemorates the birth and death anniversary of the renowned physician and second Chief Minister of West Bengal, Dr. Bidhan Chandra Roy, who was also a Bharat Ratna awardee. Dr. Roy's dedication to medical service and his significant role in establishing medical institutions in India made him a symbol of selfless service. This year's theme is "Behind the Mask: Who Heals the Healers?".



Chartered Accountants' Day (India) : 01 July :-

Chartered Accountants' Day, popularly known as CA Day, is celebrated in India every year on July 1 to mark the founding of the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India (ICAI) in 1949. The ICAI is one of the largest accounting bodies in the world and plays a crucial role in regulating the profession of chartered accountancy in India. This day celebrates the important role CAs play in maintaining financial transparency, ensuring tax

compliance, auditing financial statements, and guiding businesses with strategic advice.



GST Day (India) : 01 July :-

GST Day is observed every year in India on July 1 to mark the anniversary of the implementation of the Goods and Services Tax (GST), which came into effect on July 1, 2017. GST replaced a complex web of multiple indirect taxes with a single, unified tax regime, streamlining India's indirect tax structure. The reform aimed to create a common national market, improve ease of doing business, and curb tax evasion by bringing more transparency. GST subsumed various state and central taxes like excise duty, VAT, and service tax, thus simplifying tax compliance for businesses.



World UFO Day : 02 July :-

World UFO Day is observed every year on July 2nd to raise awareness about unidentified flying objects (UFOs) and to encourage people to look up at the skies and wonder about the possibility of extraterrestrial life. The date commemorates the supposed crash of a UFO near Roswell, New Mexico, in 1947, which sparked one of the most famous UFO conspiracies in history. Celebrating

World UFO Day is also a way to remind people of the vastness of the universe and the possibility that humanity might not be alone, inspiring scientific exploration and healthy debate about what lies beyond our planet.



World Sports Journalists Day :-

World Sports Journalists Day is observed every year on July 2nd to honour the tireless efforts and contributions of sports journalists and to celebrate the anniversary of the founding of the International Sports Press Association (AIPS) in 1924. This day recognizes the crucial role that sports journalists play in bringing sports stories, updates, and analyses to fans around the world. The date was chosen because AIPS was formed during the Paris Olympics, marking an important milestone in organizing and representing sports media professionals globally.



International Plastic Bag Free Day: 03 July :-

International Plastic Bag Free Day is observed every year on July 3rd to raise global awareness about the environmental impact of single-use plastic bags and to encourage people, communities, and policymakers to adopt sustainable alternatives. International Plastic Bag Free Day was established in 2009 as an initiative by the

Zero Waste Europe network, originally promoted through the Bag Free World campaign. The aim was to create a specific day dedicated to raising awareness about the environmental damage caused by single-use plastic bags and to encourage communities, governments, and individuals to take concrete actions to reduce their usage.



International Year of Cooperatives

Cooperatives Build a Better World

International Day of Cooperatives 2025 : 05 July :-

The International Day of Cooperatives, celebrated every year on the first Saturday of July, will be observed on July 5, 2025. This global observance highlights the invaluable role that cooperative businesses and organizations play in promoting sustainable development, economic democracy, and community well-being. Its roots go back to 1923 when the International Cooperative Alliance (ICA) began promoting an annual celebration to strengthen solidarity among cooperatives worldwide. In 1995, the United Nations officially proclaimed this day. This year's theme is "Cooperatives Build a Better World".



World Zoonoses Day : 06 July :-

World Zoonoses Day is observed every year on July 6th to raise awareness about zoonotic diseases — infections that are transmitted from animals to humans. The day marks the anniversary of Louis Pasteur administering the

first successful rabies vaccine to a young boy named Joseph Meister in 1885. This milestone paved the way for the prevention and control of diseases that originate in animals but pose threats to human health. Zoonotic diseases include rabies, avian flu, swine flu, and COVID-19, highlighting how closely human health is linked to animal health.



World Chocolate Day : 07 July :-

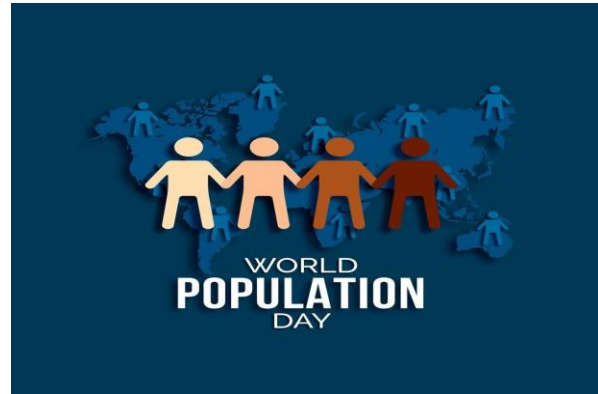
World Chocolate Day is celebrated every year on 7th July, marking a special occasion for chocolate lovers worldwide. The day commemorates the introduction of chocolate to Europe in 1550, which is believed to have laid the foundation for chocolate's global popularity. On this day, people indulge in their favourite chocolate treats, share gifts, and celebrate the cultural and culinary impact of chocolate. The day not only highlights the joy and comfort chocolate brings but also serves as a reminder of the rich history of cacao cultivation.



National Fish Farmers Day (India) : 10 July :-

National Fish Farmers Day is observed every year in India on July 10 to honor the vital role played by fish farmers, aquaculture experts, and stakeholders in boosting the country's fish production and promoting sustainable

fisheries. The day commemorates the historic achievement in 1957 when Dr. Hiralal Chaudhuri and Dr. K. H. Alikunhi successfully induced breeding of major carps through hypophysation, which laid the foundation for modern aquaculture practices in India.



World Population Day : 11 July :-

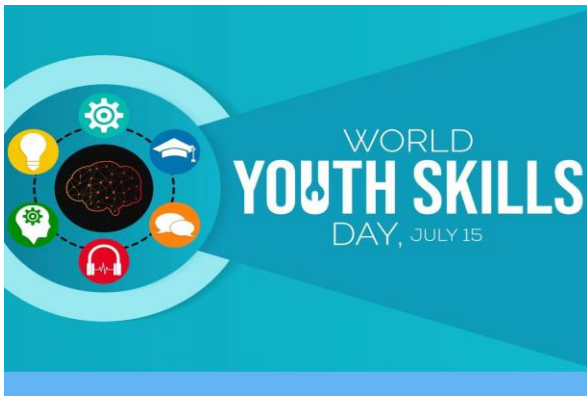
World Population Day is observed every year on July 11 to focus global attention on population-related issues, including the importance of family planning, gender equality, poverty, maternal health, and human rights. The day was first established by the Governing Council of the United Nations Development Programme in 1989, inspired by the public interest generated when the global population reached approximately five billion on 11 July 1987. Since then, this day has served as an annual reminder for governments and citizens to consider the impact of a growing population on sustainable development. This year the theme is "Empowering young people to create the families they want in a fair and hopeful world".



World Paper Bag Day : 12 July :-

World Paper Bag Day is observed globally every year on 12th July, and it reminds us of the crucial role that simple

paper bags play in promoting an eco-friendly lifestyle. The origin of World Paper Bag Day can be traced back to the invention of the first machine to mass-produce paper bags by American inventor Francis Wolle in the 19th century. Since then, paper bags have become a symbol of sustainable packaging because they are biodegradable, recyclable, and reusable. The observance highlights the power of small, daily choices in protecting the planet.

**World Youth Skills Day : 15 July :-**

World Youth Skills Day is observed every year on July 15 to highlight the strategic importance of equipping young people with skills for employment, decent work, and entrepreneurship. This day was declared by the United Nations General Assembly in 2014 to recognize how crucial technical and vocational education and training (TVET) is for youth empowerment and sustainable development. The occasion serves as a reminder for governments, educational institutions, and industries to invest in skill-building initiatives so that the growing youth population can meet the demands of an evolving job market. The year 2025 theme is “Youth empowerment through AI and digital skills”.

**World Day for International Justice : 17 July :-**

The World Day for International Justice, observed every year on July 17, is a significant occasion that highlights the importance of promoting international criminal justice and supporting the work of the International Criminal Court (ICC). This day commemorates the adoption of the Rome Statute on July 17, 1998, which established the ICC — a permanent international tribunal to prosecute individuals for genocide, crimes against humanity, war crimes, and the crime of aggression.

**International Nelson Mandela Day : 18 July :-**

International Nelson Mandela Day is observed every year on July 18 to honor the legacy of Nelson Mandela, South Africa's first Black president and a global symbol of peace, justice, and reconciliation. The United Nations officially declared this day in 2009, recognizing Mandela's 67 years of public service, including his fight against apartheid and his efforts in building a democratic and inclusive South Africa. The theme for Nelson Mandela International Day 2025 is – “It's still in our hands to combat poverty and inequity.”

**National Football Day (India) : 19 July :-**

India celebrates National Football Day every year on July 16, to honour the contribution of legendary footballer

Chuni Goswami, who was born on this day in 1938. Goswami is considered one of India's greatest footballers, having captained the national team to a gold medal at the 1962 Asian Games. He also played first-class cricket for Bengal, showcasing his multi-sport talent. The day aims to promote football across the country and inspire the youth to engage more in the sport. It is a tribute to India's footballing heritage and a step towards nurturing a stronger football culture nationwide.



World Chess Day : 20 July :-

World Chess Day is celebrated every year on July 20 to honor the establishment of the International Chess Federation (FIDE), which was founded in 1924 in Paris. The United Nations officially recognized this day in 2019, acknowledging chess as a global sport that promotes fairness, inclusivity, and intellectual growth. The day underscores how chess transcends linguistic and cultural barriers, fostering dialogue, strategy, and decision-making skills. The theme for World Chess Day 2025 is "Every Move Counts".



National Flag Day (India) : 22 July :-

National Flag Day in India is observed annually on July 22 to commemorate the adoption of the Indian national flag by the Constituent Assembly in 1947. This date holds

great historical importance as it marks the official recognition of the tricolour – saffron, white, and green with the Ashoka Chakra at the center – as the national emblem of free India. The flag symbolizes the country's values of unity, sacrifice, peace, and growth. Observing this day is an opportunity to educate citizens, especially younger generations, about the journey of India's independence and the deep symbolism the flag holds.



National Broadcasting Day (India) : 23 July :-

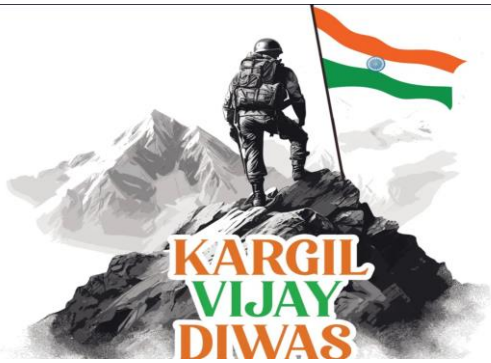
National Broadcasting Day is observed annually in India on July 23rd to commemorate a landmark moment in the history of Indian media. This day marks the beginning of organized radio broadcasting in India, which started in 1927 when the first-ever radio broadcast was made from the Bombay Station of the Indian Broadcasting Company (IBC). Later, this system was taken over by the government and renamed All India Radio (AIR) in 1936. Broadcasting has since evolved to play a vital role in shaping public discourse, spreading awareness, and preserving cultural heritage.



World IVF Day : 25 July :-

World IVF Day is observed every year on July 25 to commemorate the birth of the world's first test-tube baby, Louise Brown, who was born in England on this

date in 1978. This day marks a major milestone in reproductive medicine, as it was the first successful birth through in-vitro fertilization (IVF), offering hope to countless couples facing infertility. The day raises awareness about advancements in assisted reproductive technologies and acknowledges the efforts of medical professionals and scientists in the field.

**Kargil Vijay Diwas (India) : 26 July :-**

Kargil Vijay Diwas is observed annually on 26th July in India to commemorate the victory of the Indian Armed Forces over Pakistan in the Kargil War of 1999. The war, which lasted over two months from May to July, was fought in the Kargil district of Jammu and Kashmir after Pakistani soldiers and militants infiltrated Indian territory and occupied strategic peaks along the Line of Control (LoC). Operation Vijay was launched by India to evict the infiltrators, and it resulted in the successful recapture of most of the occupied positions by the end of July. The day marks a tribute to the courage and sacrifice of Indian soldiers, especially the 527 personnel who laid down their lives in the conflict.

**World Nature Conservation Day : 28 July :-**

World Nature Conservation Day is observed every year on July 28 to raise awareness about the urgent need to preserve the environment and natural resources. This

day highlights the importance of maintaining a healthy balance in nature by protecting forests, wildlife, water bodies, soil, and air from degradation. The formal establishment of World Nature Conservation Day occurred in 1972 at the United Nations Conference on the Human Environment in Stockholm, Sweden. However, the exact history and origin behind celebrating this day are not definitively known. The World Nature Conservation Day theme for 2025 is "Connecting People and Plants, Exploring Digital Innovation in Wildlife Conservation."

**World Hepatitis Day : 28 July :-**

World Hepatitis Day is commemorated on July 28 every year to raise global awareness about viral hepatitis, a group of infectious diseases known as Hepatitis A, B, C, D, and E, that affect millions of people worldwide. The date was chosen to honor the birthday of Dr. Baruch Blumberg, who discovered the Hepatitis B virus and developed its diagnostic test and vaccine. The day is officially recognized by the World Health Organization and serves as a crucial call to action for eliminating hepatitis as a public health threat by 2030. The theme for 2025 is "Hepatitis: Let's Break It Down".

**International Tiger Day : 29 July :-**

International Tiger Day is observed annually on July 29 to raise global awareness for tiger conservation and to promote the protection of their natural habitats. The day was established in 2010 during the Saint Petersburg Tiger Summit, where 13 tiger-range countries committed to doubling the population of wild tigers by 2022 under the

“Tx2” initiative. It highlights the alarming decline in tiger numbers due to habitat loss, poaching, and climate change. The theme for International Tiger Day 2025 is "Securing the future of Tigers with Indigenous Peoples and Local Communities at the heart".

2: Agreements



PM Modi Inks Key Bilateral Pacts with Trinidad Tobago

During his visit to Trinidad Tobago, PM Modi held talks with Prime Minister Kamla Persad-Bissessar, resulting in significant bilateral agreements. The discussions focused on agriculture, healthcare, digital payments, and cultural exchanges. Six MoUs were exchanged, covering areas like sports, diplomatic training, and cultural cooperation. This visit reinforces the longstanding relationship between the two nations, highlighting shared goals in combating climate change, disaster management, and cybersecurity.



Tata Steel inks MoU with InQuik to bring modular bridge tech to India :-

Tata Steel, one of India’s largest and most respected steel producers, has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Australian firm InQuik. This agreement aims to introduce InQuik’s modular bridge technology to the Indian infrastructure sector. Modular bridges are built using prefabricated components that can be assembled rapidly on-site, making construction faster, safer, and more economical than traditional methods. This collaboration is expected to benefit remote and rural regions in India where connectivity is often hampered by the lack of reliable bridges.



France and Britain Enhance Nuclear Cooperation Amid Security Concerns :-

In a historic move, France and Britain have agreed to coordinate their nuclear arsenals to counter growing threats in Europe. This decision, formalized in the Northwood declaration, marks a significant step in European defense strategy amid uncertainties about U.S. commitment under Trump. The cooperation aims to strengthen deterrence capabilities without merging nuclear policies. The agreement highlights the shifting dynamics in global defense alliances and the strategic

importance of nuclear deterrence in maintaining regional stability.



Prasar Bharati Signs MoU to Promote Handball in India

:-

India's public service broadcaster, Prasar Bharati, has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Handball Federation of India (HFI) to boost the promotion and growth of handball across the country. This collaboration aims to give handball greater visibility by broadcasting national and international matches, covering domestic tournaments, and producing special programs to highlight the sport's potential and talent from various states. Through this partnership, both organizations hope to inspire young athletes to take up handball, a sport that has remained on the sidelines compared to India's more dominant games like cricket or football.



Andhra govt signs MoU with NaBFID for transaction advisory services :-

The Government of Andhra Pradesh has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the National Bank for Financing Infrastructure and Development (NaBFID) to obtain specialized transaction

advisory services for its infrastructure projects. NaBFID, a development finance institution set up by the Government of India, focuses on mobilizing and managing investments for large infrastructure works like highways, energy, urban development, and transportation networks. Through this agreement, NaBFID will provide strategic support to the state government in planning, structuring, and executing complex transactions related to big projects.



EU Prepares to Retaliate Against US Tariff Threats :-

The European Union is ready to respond to the US's proposed 30% tariff on European goods, set to begin August 1. EU President Ursula von der Leyen stated the bloc will defend its interests, possibly imposing countermeasures to protect EU trade. The tariffs, part of escalating trade tensions, could affect \$9.5 trillion of transatlantic business. EU trade ministers will meet to discuss next steps, as the situation threatens global economic stability. This development is significant for understanding international trade dynamics and potential impacts on global markets.



India Signs Major Fertilizer Agreements with Saudi Arabia :-

Union Minister JP Nadda concluded a visit to Saudi Arabia, securing vital fertilizer supply agreements. These agreements will see India receiving 3.1 million metric tons of Diammonium Phosphate annually from 2025-26, a significant increase to strengthen India's fertilizer supply chain. The visit also aimed to enhance cooperation in health and pharmaceuticals, marking a strategic partnership expansion between the two nations.



Karnataka govt signs MoU with IISc to curb human-elephant conflict :-

In a significant step to address the recurring issue of human-elephant conflicts in the state, the Karnataka government has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Indian Institute of Science (IISc). This collaboration aims to leverage scientific research and technological innovations to develop effective strategies for mitigating conflicts between humans and elephants, which have been a persistent problem in many forest-fringe villages and agricultural areas of Karnataka.



India and Argentina Strengthen Agricultural Cooperation :-

India and Argentina held the 2nd Joint Working Group meeting on Agriculture, focusing on cooperation in agricultural mechanization, genome editing, and climate-resilient practices. Both nations aim to enhance productivity and farmer welfare through knowledge exchange and joint research. This partnership highlights the potential for bilateral advancements in agriculture, vital for addressing global food security challenges and promoting sustainable agricultural practices.



NIEPID-JVF MoU for Structured Education for Children with Intellectual Disabilities :-

The National Institute for the Empowerment of Persons with Intellectual Disabilities (NIEPID) has signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Jaivakeel Foundation (JVF) to provide structured, inclusive, and evidence-based educational programs for children with intellectual disabilities. This partnership aims to integrate specialized pedagogical practices, technological tools, and personalized learning plans into the education system for these children. The initiative reflects a growing emphasis on inclusive education under the National Education Policy, ensuring that children with diverse needs are not left behind.



India-UK CETA benefits Indian auto component industry

The recently signed India-UK Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA) promises significant advantages for Indian auto component manufacturers. With reduced import duties on automobiles, UK companies may shift production to India, attracted by lower costs and a burgeoning market. Sunil Mittal, Chairman of Bharti Enterprises, highlighted the potential boost in exports from India to the UK. This agreement aligns with India's 'Make in India' initiative, bolstering the country's position as a global hub for auto components. It symbolizes a strengthening bilateral economic partnership.

**UK FTA finalised after two decades :-**

Union Commerce Minister Piyush Goyal announced the finalization of the historic Free Trade Agreement with the UK. The agreement, which took over two decades to conclude, promises immense opportunities for Indian

farmers, MSMEs, and entrepreneurs. Duty-free access for 99% of Indian exports is expected to unlock \$23 billion in opportunities. The FTA marks a significant step in strengthening India-UK economic ties and fostering inclusive growth.

**India Advances Siddha Medicine's Global Reach with WHO Support :-**

In a significant move, India collaborated with WHO to finalize global training standards for Siddha medicine, enhancing its international credibility. The meeting, held on July 24-25, 2025, involved experts from 11 countries, emphasizing evidence-based practices. This initiative aligns with India's vision to promote traditional medicine globally, integrating it into national healthcare systems while preserving its cultural roots. The effort underscores India's leadership in promoting sustainable healthcare practices worldwide.

**Jennifer Geerlings-Simons Becomes Suriname's First Woman President :-**

In a historic moment for Suriname, Jennifer Geerlings-Simons has been elected as the country's first woman president, breaking a significant glass ceiling in the South American nation's political landscape. Known for her long political career and active involvement in Suriname's parliament, Geerlings-Simons' rise to the presidency is being hailed as a milestone for gender representation and women's empowerment in the region. Her election reflects a growing trend in parts of the world where more women are ascending to top

leadership roles, inspiring greater participation and advocacy for gender equality in politics and governance.



Federal Bank appoints V Venkateswaran as executive director :-

Federal Bank, a leading private sector bank in India, has appointed V Venkateswaran as its new executive director, marking a significant addition to its leadership team. 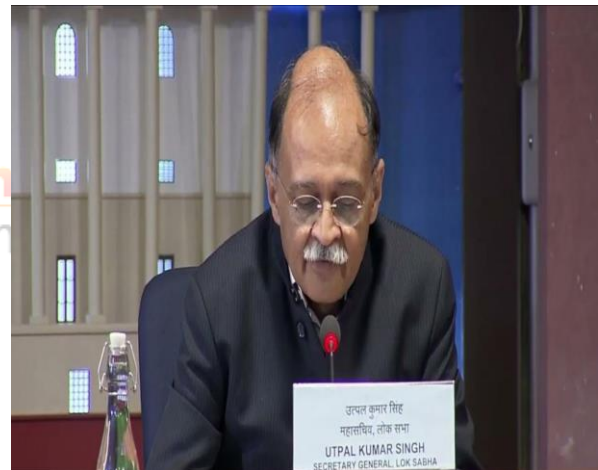
Tilak Varma Appointed South Zone Captain For Duleep Trophy :-

Former Sri Lankan cricketer Kaushal Silva has been appointed as the head coach of the Hong Kong national cricket team ahead of the upcoming Asia Cup. **Meri Panchayat App Wins WSIS Champion Award for Digital Governance :-**

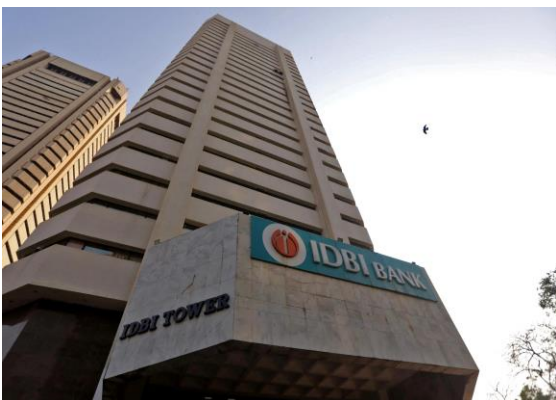

**Financial bidding for IDBI Bank expected to conclude by October 2025 :-**

The financial bidding process for the strategic sale of IDBI Bank is projected to reach its final stage by October 2025, according to officials familiar with the divestment timeline. IDBI Bank, which is co-owned by the Government of India and LIC, has been on the divestment radar as part of the government's broader plan to reduce its stake in public sector enterprises and attract private capital. The process involves potential

investors submitting their financial bids after clearing due diligence and regulatory requirements.



1.12 Lakh Counterfeit Rs. 500 Notes Found During 2024-25: RBI Governor :-

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) Governor has revealed that during the financial year 2024–25, authorities detected a significant number of fake ₹500 currency notes — totaling about 1.12 lakh pieces — circulating within the country. This startling figure underlines ongoing challenges faced by India's banking and law enforcement systems in tackling counterfeit currency despite modern security features embedded in the redesigned notes after demonetisation. The ₹500 denomination remains one of the most targeted by counterfeiters because of its wide usage in daily transactions.



RBI fines HDFC Bank, Shriram Finance for violating certain norms :-

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI), which regulates and monitors the country's entire banking and financial system, has imposed monetary penalties on HDFC Bank and Shriram Finance Limited because they failed to adhere to specific regulatory requirements related to loan disbursement and customer verification processes.

According to the RBI, HDFC Bank was fined for lapses connected to its auto loan portfolio where the bank did not adequately follow proper guidelines while selling third-party non-financial products to its auto loan customers, which created issues of mis-selling and lack of transparency. On the other hand, Shriram Finance faced penalties due to non-compliance with certain norms under the NBFC (Non-Banking Financial Company) framework.



NPCI International adds 13 more banks in UPI-PayNow linkage to ease remittances :-

The National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI) International Payments Limited (NIPL) has significantly expanded the UPI-PayNow cross-border payment linkage by adding 13 more Indian banks to the network. This strategic move aims to further streamline and simplify real-time remittances between India and Singapore. The newly onboarded banks include Axis Bank, Bank of Baroda, DBS Bank India, ICICI Bank, Indian Bank, Indian Overseas Bank, Karur Vysya Bank, Kotak Mahindra Bank, Punjab National Bank, South Indian Bank, UCO Bank, Union Bank of India, and Yes Bank.



RBI drains Rs 2-lakh crore liquidity :-

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has undertaken a significant monetary action by draining Rs 2 lakh crore

worth of liquidity from the financial system. This move is typically aimed at controlling inflation, stabilizing currency volatility, and ensuring financial discipline in the banking sector. The liquidity withdrawal could have been carried out through instruments such as Variable Rate Reverse Repo (VRRR) operations or other open market tools. While it helps moderate excess cash flow that can fuel inflationary pressures, such an action may also lead to tighter credit availability in the short term.



Finance Minister Sitharaman Announces RRB Amalgamation to Boost Efficiency :-

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman has announced the reduction of Regional Rural Banks (RRBs) from 43 to 28 to simplify management and enhance service delivery. This amalgamation, effective from May 1, 2025, aims to improve financial stability and operational efficiency by consolidating resources and leveraging advanced technology. The move aligns with the government's goal of achieving scale efficiency and cost rationalization, ultimately benefiting rural financial inclusion and service access. RBI extends tenure of oversight panel of IndusInd Bank by one month :-

The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has decided to extend the tenure of the oversight committee it had set up to supervise IndusInd Bank by an additional one month. This move indicates that the RBI still sees a need for close monitoring of the bank's functioning and internal systems, possibly due to governance or risk management concerns. Oversight panels are typically appointed to ensure enhanced regulatory compliance and to assess the progress of corrective actions suggested by the regulator. The extension suggests that more time is needed to meet satisfactory benchmarks.



Karnataka based Karwar Urban Co-op Bank loses license :-

The Reserve Bank of India has canceled the banking license of Karwar Urban Co-operative Bank, located in Karnataka, due to its deteriorating financial position and inability to comply with regulatory norms. The decision was made as the bank lacked adequate capital and earning prospects, making it unfit to operate in the interest of depositors. As a result, the bank is prohibited from conducting banking business, and the Deposit Insurance and Credit Guarantee Corporation (DICGC) will settle claims of eligible depositors. This reflects ongoing efforts by the RBI to protect customers from weak financial institutions.



Ashok Leyland partners with West Bengal Gramin Bank for vehicle financing :-

Former IPS officer V.S. Ravi launched his book Confessions of a Shakespeare Addict :-

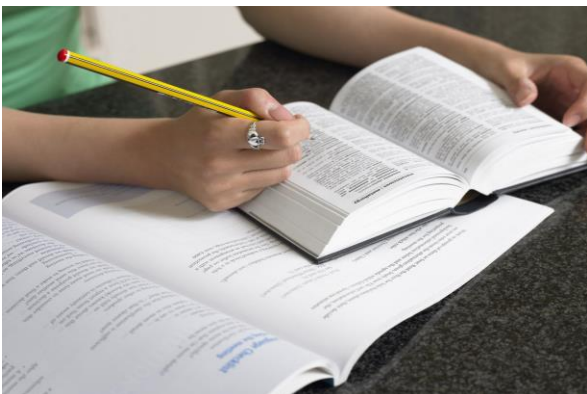
A new book titled Confessions of a Shakespeare Addict written by V.S. Ravi, a former Indian Police Service (IPS)

SIMBEX focuses on enhancing maritime interoperability and mutual understanding between the two navies through advanced naval drills, tactical maneuvers, and simulated combat scenarios. The 2025 exercise is expected to feature participation from frontline warships, submarines, and maritime patrol aircraft, reflecting growing maritime collaboration in the Indo-Pacific region.



Indian Army receives first batch of Apache helicopters from US :-

The Indian Army has officially received its first batch of AH-64E Apache attack helicopters from the United States, marking a significant boost to its aerial combat capabilities. These state-of-the-art helicopters, known for their precision strike abilities, advanced sensors, and combat versatility, will be deployed primarily along India's western borders to enhance tactical operations. The delivery is part of a deal signed under the Foreign Military Sales (FMS) program, where the Army is acquiring six Apache helicopters, separate from those already in use by the Indian Air Force.



Thailand-Cambodia Border Clash Escalates, Fighter Jet Deployed :-

Tensions between Thailand and Cambodia escalated as a Thai F-16 jet bombed targets in Cambodia amid a border dispute. The clash led to civilian casualties, with both countries accusing each other of aggression. Thailand closed its border with Cambodia following landmine incidents. The conflict, centered around disputed territories, has reignited historical tensions. Diplomatic efforts are underway to de-escalate the situation, with both sides calling for adherence to international law.



India and China Review Border Situation, Plan Next Talks :-

India and China held the 34th WMCC meeting in New Delhi, reviewing the Line of Actual Control (LAC) situation and discussing peace and stability measures. Led by Gourangalal Das and Hong Liang, the delegations acknowledged improved bilateral ties and planned the next round of Special Representatives talks. The WMCC, established in 2012, continues to facilitate dialogue and confidence-building, addressing border management and diplomatic engagement at multiple levels.



Thailand and Cambodia engage in artillery fire amid conflict :-

Thailand and Cambodia have exchanged heavy artillery fire as border conflicts escalate, marking the worst fighting in over a decade. The clashes have resulted in casualties and widespread evacuations on both sides. The conflict underscores longstanding territorial disputes and poses a significant challenge to regional stability. International calls for a ceasefire have been issued, urging both nations to resolve the crisis through dialogue. The situation highlights the volatile nature of border disputes in Southeast Asia.



MoD Signs Rs 2,000 Crore Deal for Advanced Radars with BEL :-

The Ministry of Defence signed a Rs 2,000 crore contract with Bharat Electronics Limited for air defence radars, aimed at modernizing India's air defence capabilities. These indigenous radars, with 70% local content, will detect aerial threats, enhancing the Indian Army's operational readiness. This procurement supports India's 'Make in India' initiative, encouraging local manufacturing and contributing to the nation's economic growth while strengthening defence preparedness.



Operation Mahadev: Three Terrorists Neutralized in Kashmir :-

Union Home Minister Amit Shah announced the successful neutralization of three terrorists involved in the Pahalgam terror attack during Operation Mahadev. The operation, conducted by the Indian Army, CRPF, and Jammu Kashmir Police, eliminated key Lashkar-e-Taiba operatives. This anti-terror initiative underscores India's commitment to counter-terrorism and restoring peace in the region. Such operations are crucial for dismantling terror networks and ensuring security in Jammu Kashmir. The government's proactive approach highlights its resolve in safeguarding national security and addressing cross-border terrorism.



Indian Army Foils Infiltration Attempt in J's Poonch Sector :-

In a successful operation, the Indian Army eliminated two terrorists attempting to infiltrate the Line of Control in Jammu and Kashmir's Poonch sector. Codenamed Operation ShivShakti, the mission was based on precise intelligence inputs from the Indian Army and J Police. The operation highlights the vigilant efforts of Indian forces in maintaining national security amidst ongoing threats. This action follows a series of counter-terror operations in the region, underscoring the Indian military's readiness and strategic capabilities in thwarting terrorist activities along its borders.

8: Economy



India's Pharma Exports Reach \$4.9 Billion in April-May FY26 :-

India's pharmaceutical exports surged to \$4.9 billion in April-May FY26, marking a 7.38% increase compared to the previous year. The Pharmaceuticals Export Promotion Council (Pharmexcil) attributes this growth to strategic initiatives in sustainable manufacturing, expanded global market presence, and digital innovation. Drug formulations and biologicals dominated exports, accounting for 75.74% of the total. Key destinations include the US, Europe, and NAFTA regions. The ongoing India-UK Free Trade Agreement discussions are expected to enhance supply chains and attract foreign investments.



Gujarat Joins Top Trio with Over 1 Crore Stock Market Investors :-

Gujarat has become the third Indian state to surpass one crore registered stock market investors, joining Maharashtra and Uttar Pradesh. This milestone reflects

the state's growing participation in financial markets, contributing significantly to the national investor base of 11.5 crore. Recent data from the National Stock Exchange highlights a surge in investor numbers, with North and East India leading growth at 24% and 23% respectively. This trend underscores a shift in investment momentum, with increasing participation across regions.



Aadhaar Authentication Transactions Reach Record High :-

Aadhaar authentication transactions surged to nearly 230 crore in June 2025, highlighting its growing role in India's digital ecosystem. The Unique Identification Authority of India (UIDAI) reported significant increases in transactions and face authentication usage. This expansion underscores Aadhaar's importance in facilitating welfare delivery and enhancing ease of living for Indian citizens. The data reflects the continued integration of Aadhaar in various sectors, promoting efficiency and security.



Government Extends NPS Tax Benefits to Unified Pension Scheme :-

In a move to enhance retirement security, the Indian government has extended NPS tax benefits to the Unified Pension Scheme (UPS). This decision aims to make UPS more attractive for central government employees, offering parity between the two pension options. UPS provides a defined pension with government and employee contributions. **Oil Prices Drop as OPEC+ Increases August Output :-**

Oil prices fell after OPEC+ announced a larger-than-expected increase in August output. The decision to raise production by 548,000 barrels per day comes amid ongoing uncertainties over US tariffs and their impact on global economic growth. The output hike reflects a strategic shift by OPEC+ to capture market share, despite potential price declines. Analysts anticipate further production increases in September, underscoring the complex dynamics influencing global oil markets.

**India-Brazil Trade Set to Reach \$20 Billion in Five Years**

Prime Minister Narendra Modi announced plans to enhance India-Brazil trade to \$20 billion over the next five years. This ambitious target reflects the deepening economic ties between the two nations. During his visit to Brazil, PM Modi emphasized cooperation in trade, clean energy, defense, and AI. The two countries aim to expand the India-MERCOSUR Preferential Trade Agreement, fostering a robust partnership. Such economic collaborations are crucial for strengthening bilateral relations and promoting mutual growth in the global economy.

**Piyush Goyal Eyes ₹20 Lakh Crore Agri Exports with Processing Focus :-**

Union Minister Piyush Goyal highlighted India's potential to increase agriculture and fisheries exports to ₹20 lakh crore by enhancing food processing and branding standards. Addressing the ICC: Krishi Vikram session, he emphasized the importance of resilient agricultural supply chains, water conservation, and adopting innovative practices. Goyal also advocated for the use of smart pumps and drip irrigation to improve crop yield and make Indian agriculture more climate-resilient, aligning with India's vision for self-reliance and global market expansion.



India Aims for Energy Independence by 2047: Hardeep Singh Puri :-

At the 9th OPEC International Seminar, Minister Hardeep Singh Puri outlined India's roadmap for energy security, targeting independence by 2047 and net-zero emissions by 2070. The plan includes expanding hydrocarbon exploration and diversifying crude oil sources. Puri emphasized India's role as a stabilizing force in global energy markets, with initiatives like the Global Biofuels Alliance and Pradhan Mantri Ujjwala Yojana, reflecting India's commitment to sustainable energy and affordable access for its citizens.

**India's Gold Reserves Increase Amid Global Economic Uncertainty :-**

India's gold reserves increased by \$342 million, reaching \$84.846 billion, as per the latest Reserve Bank of India data. This rise comes amid a rally in domestic and global bullion markets, driven by economic uncertainties and trade tensions. India's forex reserves stand at \$699.736 billion. The increase in gold reserves highlights the country's strategic approach to maintaining economic stability and hedging against global market fluctuations.

**Favourable Agricultural Output to Boost Rural Consumption in FY26 :-**

A new report predicts that favourable agricultural output, easing inflation, and reduced income tax burdens

will bolster rural consumption in India for FY26. With private final consumption expenditure constituting nearly 60% of India's GDP, this trend is crucial for overall economic growth. The report highlights the importance of monitoring household income factors to sustain private consumption growth. A good monsoon is expected to further support rural consumption, while policy measures like RBI rate cuts aim to enhance urban demand. These factors collectively contribute to India's economic resilience and growth prospects.

**Bitcoin Reaches \$120,000 Amid Industry Optimism :-**

Bitcoin, the world's leading cryptocurrency, has surged to an unprecedented price of \$120,000, driven by growing optimism within the crypto industry and increased institutional interest. This new record high comes as investors anticipate favorable regulatory developments and wider adoption of blockchain technology across various sectors. The price rally has reignited debates about Bitcoin's potential as a hedge against inflation and a digital store of value. Market analysts attribute this surge to renewed confidence, positive macroeconomic signals.

**Minister Sarbananda Sonowal inaugurated the second BIMSTEC Ports Conclave in Visakhapatnam :-**

Union Minister Sarbananda Sonowal inaugurated the second BIMSTEC Ports Conclave in Visakhapatnam, highlighting the potential of the Bay of Bengal as a global trade and tourism hub. The conclave, attended by representatives from all seven BIMSTEC nations, focused on collaborative efforts to enhance maritime trade and sustainable development. Key discussions included port-led industrialization and digital integration to create a seamless and efficient port network, aiming to drive regional prosperity under India's 'Neighbourhood First' policy.



CPI Inflation Drops to 2.10% in June 2025 :-

India's Consumer Price Index (CPI) inflation fell to 2.10% in June, marking its lowest level in over six years. The decline is attributed to easing food prices, offering relief to households. The data indicates that inflation is well within the Reserve Bank of India's target range, providing policymakers room to focus on growth and employment. Economists suggest that while food prices have moderated, the rise in services costs warrants careful monitoring to maintain economic stability.



India's Wholesale Inflation Turns Negative in June 2025

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India's wholesale inflation entered negative territory for the first time this year, with the Wholesale Price Index (WPI) falling to -0.13% in June. The decline was driven by drops in food and fuel prices, while manufactured products saw a moderate increase. This aligns with the recent moderation in retail inflation, offering policymakers room to focus on stimulating economic growth. The Reserve Bank of India recently cut the repo rate, indicating optimism for economic recovery.



India's EV Sales Projected to Cross 7% Market Share by FY28 :-

A report by CareEdge Advisory projects that India's electric vehicle (EV) sales could surpass a 7% market share by FY28, contingent on supply chain resolutions for rare earth elements. The Indian EV market has seen significant growth, expanding from over 5,000 units in FY21 to over 1.07 lakh units in FY25. Government initiatives like FAME III and the PLI Scheme aim to boost adoption through policy support and infrastructure development. The report emphasizes the importance of expanding charging infrastructure and battery localization to sustain the growth trajectory.

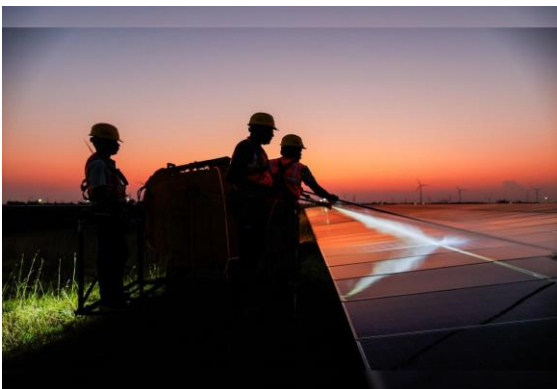


Cabinet Clears Special Exemption for NLCIL's Renewable Energy Expansion :-

The Indian Cabinet has approved a special exemption allowing NLC India Limited to invest Rs. 7,000 crore in renewable energy projects without adhering to certain investment guidelines for Navratna CPSEs. This decision aims to enhance NLCIL's operational flexibility and aligns with India's climate commitments to achieve 500 GW of non-fossil fuel energy capacity by 2030. The move supports NLCIL's target of developing 10.11 GW of renewable energy by 2030 and expanding to 32 GW by 2047, contributing to India's broader sustainable energy goals.

**NTPC's Renewable Energy Investment Powers Boosted by Cabinet :-**

The Cabinet has granted NTPC Limited enhanced powers to invest up to Rs. 20,000 crore in renewable energy, significantly increasing from the previous Rs. 7,500 crore limit. This decision aims to accelerate NTPC's renewable energy capacity to 60 GW by 2032, supporting India's climate goals. The initiative will strengthen India's power grid, create employment, and foster economic growth, aligning with the nation's energy transition targets.

**Tata Power secures first battery energy storage purchase agreement from NHPC :-**

Tata Power has signed a landmark deal with NHPC (National Hydroelectric Power Corporation), marking the first-ever Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) Purchase Agreement by the public sector hydropower company. The agreement includes a 150 MW/300 MWh battery storage capacity that will help NHPC integrate renewable energy sources more reliably into the grid. This collaboration is aimed at enhancing energy storage infrastructure in India and ensuring grid stability amid growing renewable energy deployment.

**India-UAE Partnership Targets Nuclear Energy and Technology :-**

India and the UAE are enhancing their strategic partnership, focusing on nuclear energy and advanced technology. Bilateral trade has exceeded \$100 billion, with plans to expand cooperation in these sectors. Recent diplomatic engagements have strengthened economic ties, with significant investments and future projects in technology integration and education. The partnership aims to establish India as a global hub for content creation and sustainable growth, leveraging the strengths of both nations.



India's UPI Sets Global Benchmark with 18 Billion Transactions in June :-

India has emerged as a global leader in fast payments, with the Unified Payments Interface (UPI) processing over ₹24.03 lakh crore through 18.39 billion transactions in June, according to an IMF report. UPI now powers 85% of all digital transactions in India and nearly 50% of global real-time digital payments. It handles more than 640 million transactions daily, surpassing Visa's volume. UPI's success story, which started in 2016, is a testament to India's digital infrastructure, and its global expansion marks a new era in fintech innovation.

**SAIL Supplies Steel for Zojila Tunnel: A Boost for Strategic Connectivity :-**

The Steel Authority of India Limited (SAIL) has supplied over 31,000 tonnes of steel for the construction of the Zojila tunnel, India's longest road tunnel and Asia's longest bi-directional tunnel. Located in the Himalayas, the 30-kilometer tunnel will provide all-weather connectivity between Srinagar and Leh, enhancing both civilian and military mobility. This infrastructure project is crucial for national security and regional economic development, reinforcing India's strategic infrastructure capabilities.

**Over 34 Crore Jobs Created in MSME Sector Since 2014: Government :-**

The Indian government reports that over 34 crore people have gained employment through the MSME sector since 2014, facilitated by platforms like Udyam and Udyam Assist. The sector is considered crucial for India's industrial growth, with measures to boost credit access and redefine MSME classifications. With 6 crore MSMEs in India, lending has surged significantly, highlighting the sector's role in economic development. Government initiatives continue to strengthen MSMEs as a backbone of India's economy.

**India implements world's largest grain storage plan in cooperative sector :-**

India has embarked on implementing the world's largest grain storage initiative in the cooperative sector, aiming to significantly expand its food storage infrastructure. Under this plan, large-scale grain storage facilities will be developed across rural areas with active participation from cooperative societies and Panchayats. The objective is to reduce post-harvest losses, ensure better price realization for farmers, and create an efficient supply chain. The initiative, coordinated by the Ministry of Cooperation, is expected to add over 700 lakh metric tonnes of storage capacity in phases.



India Achieves 20% Ethanol Blending in Petrol, Ahead of Schedule :-

India has successfully reached a milestone of 20% ethanol blending in petrol in 2025, five years ahead of its original target set for 2030. Petroleum and Natural Gas Minister Hardeep Singh Puri highlighted this achievement, noting significant economic and environmental benefits. Ethanol blending has surged from 1.5% in 2014 to 20% in 2025, resulting in ₹1.36 lakh crore saved in foreign exchange and ₹1.96 lakh crore paid to distilleries. The initiative supports India's clean energy goals, reduces carbon emissions by 698 lakh tonnes, and boosts rural incomes through increased payments to farmers.

**Manufacturing Drives India's Flash PMI to 60.7 in July :-**

India's private sector showed robust growth in July, with the HSBC Flash India Composite PMI Output Index rising to 60.7. The Manufacturing PMI reached its highest in 17-and-a-half years at 59.2, driven by strong sales, export orders, and output levels. Despite inflationary pressures, Indian companies remain optimistic about future growth. The survey highlights healthy job creation, particularly in the service sector, and indicates a quickening pace of economic expansion, attributed to buoyant demand and technological investment.

**India's Digital Payment Surge: 65,000 Crore Transactions in Six Years :-**

India has witnessed a remarkable surge in digital payments, recording over 65,000 crore transactions worth ₹12,000 lakh crore between FY20 and FY25. The government's initiatives, such as the Payments Infrastructure Development Fund, have significantly boosted digital adoption across the country, including in rural areas. Platforms like UPI have empowered small vendors and rural users, promoting financial inclusion. This digital transformation is crucial for India's economic growth, reducing cash dependency, and enhancing access to formal financial services. The trend underscores India's progress towards a more digital and inclusive economy.

**India's Oil and Gas Exploration Focuses on Andaman Deepwater :-**

Iran Reports 71 Casualties in Israeli Strike on Evin Prison

Iranian officials reported that an Israeli airstrike on Tehran's Evin Prison resulted in 71 deaths, including detainees and administrative staff. The strike marks an escalation in Israel's targets, extending beyond military sites to symbolic locations within Iran's ruling system. This attack raises concerns over regional stability and the safety of foreign nationals detained in Iran. The incident underscores the tense geopolitical dynamics and the potential for further conflict in the region.



US Bombing Damages Iran's Fordow Nuclear Site :-

Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araqchi confirmed that the US bombing of the Fordow nuclear site has caused significant damage. This development follows US President Donald Trump's assertion that the strikes have obliterated Iran's nuclear capabilities. While intercepted communications suggest Iran is downplaying the damage, the full extent is under evaluation by Iran's Atomic Energy Organization. The incident underscores

the escalating tensions between the US and Iran over nuclear developments and regional security dynamics.



Ferry Sinks Near Indonesia's Bali: Four Dead, 30 Missing

:-

A ferry carrying 65 passengers sank near Bali, Indonesia, resulting in four confirmed deaths and 30 missing individuals. The KMP Tunu Pratama Jaya capsized shortly after leaving East Java, with strong currents and winds hampering rescue efforts. Despite challenges, a search operation involving helicopters and underwater rescuers is underway. This incident highlights the recurring safety issues in Indonesia's maritime transport sector, where lax safety standards often lead to such tragic accidents.



Trump's Tax-Cut Bill Wins Congressional Approval :-

President Donald Trump's tax-cut package, aimed at funding immigration policies and making 2017 tax cuts permanent, has passed through Congress. The bill, which includes significant cuts to healthcare and safety net programs, has been met with mixed reactions. While Republicans tout the legislation as a boost to economic

growth, Democrats criticize it as benefiting the wealthy at the expense of the poor. The bill's approval marks a key legislative victory for Trump, albeit amidst concerns over its long-term fiscal impact.



F-16 Escorts Aircraft Out of Restricted Airspace Near Trump's Golf Course :-

An F-16 fighter jet intercepted a civilian aircraft that violated restricted airspace near President Trump's golf course in Bedminster, New Jersey. This incident marks the fifth airspace breach on the same day, prompting NORAD to conduct a 'headbutt maneuver' to safely escort the plane out. Such breaches highlight ongoing challenges in managing airspace security around high-profile locations, necessitating heightened vigilance and pilot awareness.



U.S. Condemns Attack on American Aid Workers in Gaza

Two American aid workers were injured in an attack at a food distribution site in Gaza. The U.S. blames Hamas for the grenade assault, which occurred during a humanitarian mission by the Gaza Humanitarian Foundation. The incident underscores the fragile security environment in Gaza and the challenges faced by aid organizations in conflict zones. The U.S. continues to call

for peace and condemns acts of violence against humanitarian efforts.



Elon Musk Forms 'America Party' Amid Political Rift with Trump :-

Elon Musk announced the formation of the 'America Party', signaling a significant political shift and escalating his rift with President Trump. This move follows Musk's opposition to Trump's recent tax bill, which he claims threatens America's financial stability. Musk's political ambitions and the party's creation could reshape the U.S. political landscape, challenging the traditional bipartisan system and influencing future elections.



Typhoon Danas Hits Southern Taiwan, Causing Widespread Damage :-

Typhoon Danas struck southern Taiwan with record winds and heavy rain, resulting in two fatalities and over 330 injuries. The rare hit to the island's west coast led to power outages and flight cancellations. As the typhoon weakened, it continued its path toward eastern China, prompting heightened alerts. The impact on Taiwan underscores the increasing vulnerability of densely populated regions to extreme weather events,

highlighting the need for robust disaster preparedness and response strategies.



Floods on Nepal-China Border: Dozens Missing :-

Heavy rainfall in Tibet has triggered flooding in the Bhote Koshi River, affecting areas along the Nepal-China border. The deluge washed away the 'Friendship Bridge', leaving over two dozen people missing, including 18 in Nepal and 11 in China. The floods have also damaged infrastructure, including a hydroelectric plant and imported goods containers. Search and rescue operations are ongoing, with the Nepal Army having rescued 11 individuals so far. The incident highlights the region's vulnerability to natural disasters and the need for robust cross-border disaster management strategies.



US Restores \$6.8 Million Aid for Tibetans :-

The United States has reinstated \$6.8 million in aid for Tibetans in South Asia, reversing cuts made during the Trump administration. This funding aims to support Tibetan communities in securing food and preventing the spread of diseases. The U.S. has urged China to cease interference in the Dalai Lama's succession, emphasizing support for Tibetans' rights and cultural identity. The restoration of aid reflects the U.S.'s continued

commitment to advancing human rights and dignity for Tibetan communities, amidst geopolitical tensions with China.



Japan to Continue Trade Talks with US Amid Tariff Threats :-

Japanese Prime Minister Shigeru Ishiba announced continued negotiations with the U.S. to secure a beneficial trade deal, following President Trump's announcement of 25% tariffs on Japanese goods. Ishiba highlighted the importance of protecting Japan's national interests while seeking mutual benefits. The discussions aim to mitigate potential economic impacts and strengthen bilateral trade relations. The situation highlights the complexities of international trade negotiations and the need for strategic diplomacy to navigate economic challenges.

UAE Clarifies Golden Visa Rules Amid Misleading Claims

The UAE's Federal Authority for Identity, Citizenship, Customs and Port Security has clarified the Golden Visa requirements after misleading reports in Indian media suggested easy access to lifetime residency. Official channels remain the only legitimate way to apply for these long-term residency permits, which offer significant independence and stability for foreign

nationals. The authority stressed that no external consultancy services are recognized in the application process and warned against false claims. This clarification is crucial for aspirants seeking to leverage the opportunities offered by the UAE's progressive residency policies.



PM Modi Concludes Five-Nation Tour with BRICS Summit Participation :-

Prime Minister Narendra Modi returned to New Delhi after a comprehensive five-nation tour, including Ghana, Trinidad and Tobago, Argentina, Brazil, and Namibia. The tour from July 2 to 9 also featured his participation in the 17th BRICS Summit in Rio de Janeiro under Brazil's chairmanship. The visits aimed to strengthen bilateral ties across various sectors such as economic development, defence, and energy. In each country, PM Modi received honors and discussed expanding strategic and comprehensive partnerships, reflecting India's growing global influence.



India Advocates Maritime Safety at 134th IMO Council in London :-

India emphasized its commitment to maritime safety and gender inclusivity at the 134th International Maritime

Organization Council session in London. The Indian delegation, led by T.K. Ramachandran, called for urgent global reviews of maritime incidents involving undeclared hazardous cargo. India proposed IMO-led investigations to develop best practices for safer maritime operations. Additionally, India highlighted its national initiative 'Sagar Mein Samman', promoting gender equality in the maritime sector, reflecting its commitment to a safe and inclusive workforce.



South Korea's Ex-Leader Yoon Suk Yeol Returns to Jail Amid Legal Woes :-

Former South Korean President Yoon Suk Yeol has been detained again over charges related to his martial law bid last year. The Seoul Central District Court approved a new detention warrant, citing concerns about evidence tampering. Yoon faces criminal charges of insurrection, which could result in life imprisonment. His legal troubles highlight the complex political landscape in South Korea and the challenges of upholding accountability and rule of law in democratic systems.



Trump Imposes 50% Tariffs on Brazil Amid Diplomatic Tensions :-

U.S. President Donald Trump announced a 50% tariff on Brazilian imports following a diplomatic spat with President Luiz Inacio Lula da Silva. The tariffs are linked to Brazil's treatment of former President Jair Bolsonaro. Lula has promised reciprocal measures, escalating tensions between the two nations. The move, criticized as damaging to bilateral relations, could impact trade, especially in sectors like agriculture, highlighting the volatile nature of international trade policies.



Iran to Cooperate with IAEA Amid Safety Concerns :-

Iran's Foreign Minister Abbas Araqchi announced plans for cooperation with the U.N. nuclear watchdog, IAEA, despite new restrictions imposed by Iran's parliament. The law, passed after recent bombings, requires the Supreme National Security Council's approval for inspections. Iran emphasizes safety and security concerns for inspectors at its nuclear sites. While continuing cooperation, Iran insists on its right to enrich uranium. The situation presents challenges for future negotiations and emphasizes the need for careful safety assessments at nuclear sites. This development is critical for understanding Iran's stance on nuclear inspections and international relations.



India's EAM Jaishankar Visits Singapore to Strengthen Ties :-

External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar visited Singapore to reinforce India's strategic partnership with the nation. He met with Singapore's President and key ministers to discuss investments, infrastructure, and regional developments. The visit follows key outcomes from Prime Minister Modi's recent Singapore visit, aiming to enhance bilateral cooperation in sectors like semiconductors and skill development.



UK Lifts Ban on Pakistani Airlines After Five-Year Suspension :-

The United Kingdom has lifted a five-year ban on Pakistani airlines, allowing them to apply for resuming UK flights. The ban, imposed in 2020 following a PIA plane crash investigation, was lifted after Pakistani authorities made safety improvements. This decision follows similar steps by the European Union. Pakistan International Airlines (PIA) plans to resume flights with the Islamabad-Manchester route, potentially restoring its profitable UK routes. The lifting of the ban coincides with Pakistan's efforts to privatize its national carrier, with several groups bidding for a significant stake, aiming to enhance the airline's value and operations.



US Grand Jury Documents in Epstein Case to be Released :-

The Trump administration seeks court approval to release grand jury documents related to Jeffrey Epstein's case. This decision follows public controversy and demands for transparency regarding Epstein's clients and his death in custody. The move aims to address conspiracy theories and provide clarity on the case, underscoring the complexities of high-profile legal proceedings and the public's interest in justice and accountability.

**Tragic Capsize in Vietnam's Ha Long Bay Claims 37 Lives**

A cruise ship capsized in Vietnam's Ha Long Bay, leading to the tragic loss of 37 lives. The incident occurred amid a sudden storm, causing the vessel to sink with 48 passengers on board. Rescue efforts have pulled 11 survivors from the water, but many remain missing. This disaster has prompted a large-scale rescue operation and a call for a thorough investigation from Vietnam's Prime Minister. Ha Long Bay, a UNESCO World Heritage site, is one of Vietnam's top tourist destinations, making this incident particularly shocking.

**US Court Reviews Trump's Birthright Citizenship Order**

A US court is reviewing President Trump's executive order limiting birthright citizenship, following a Supreme Court decision affecting nationwide injunctions. Democratic attorneys general argue the order violates the 14th Amendment, posing challenges for federal benefits programs. The case highlights ongoing legal battles over immigration policies and the broader implications for citizenship rights. The court's decision will impact future interpretations of executive authority and the legal landscape surrounding immigration in the US.

**Trump withdraws US from UNESCO for second time :-**

President Donald Trump announced the US withdrawal from UNESCO, citing the agency's support for 'woke' and 'divisive' cultural causes. This move, echoing Trump's first-term decision, aligns with his 'America-first' policy and skepticism of multilateral organizations. The withdrawal, effective next year, reflects ongoing tensions over UNESCO's perceived anti-Israel bias and globalist agenda. While the decision is criticized for undermining international cooperation, it highlights the challenges in balancing national interests with global cultural and educational initiatives.



UAE to Phase Out SMS and Email OTP Authentication by 2026 :-

The UAE Central Bank has mandated the elimination of SMS and email-based OTP authentication by March 2026, enhancing digital banking security. Financial institutions will adopt advanced methods like Emirates Face Recognition and biometric verification. The move is part of the UAE's Financial Infrastructure Transformation (FIT) Programme, supporting secure, risk-based authentication technologies and marking a significant shift in digital security standards.

**India Resumes Tourist Visas for Chinese Citizens After Five Years :-**

The Indian government has officially resumed the issuance of tourist visas to Chinese nationals after a five-year suspension that began in the wake of heightened tensions between the two countries, particularly following the COVID-19 pandemic and border conflicts. This move signals a step toward easing strained diplomatic relations and promoting people-to-people exchanges between the Asian neighbors. The decision is expected to boost tourism-related sectors and reflects a broader effort to normalize bilateral engagement after years of limited connectivity.

**Indian Embassy issues advisory amid Thailand-Cambodia tensions :-**

Amid escalating tensions along the Thailand-Cambodia border, the Indian Embassy in Thailand has issued a travel advisory for Indian tourists. The advisory urges travelers to remain vigilant and stay informed through official Thai sources. The conflict has resulted in casualties and increased military activity along the border. Indian nationals are advised to avoid travel to certain regions, as authorities work to manage the situation. This advisory highlights the need for travelers to prioritize safety in conflict-prone areas.

**France's plan to recognize Palestinian state draws criticism :-**

French President Emmanuel Macron's announcement to recognize a Palestinian state at the UN General Assembly has sparked criticism from Israel and the US. Macron's decision aims to support peace in the Middle East, but Israel views the move as rewarding terrorism. The US has expressed strong opposition, citing potential setbacks to peace efforts. The recognition is part of France's broader strategy to engage in Middle East peace processes, although it faces significant diplomatic challenges.



PM Modi, Maldivian President Inaugurate Defence Ministry Building in Male :-

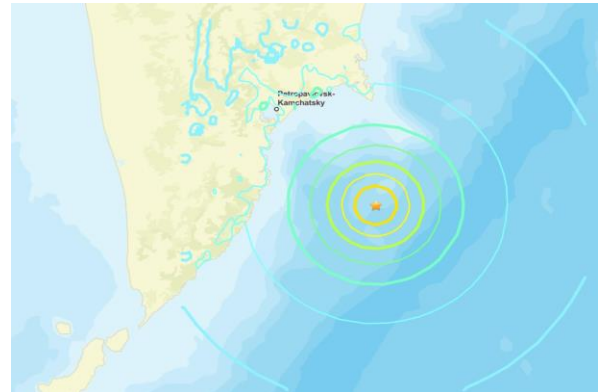

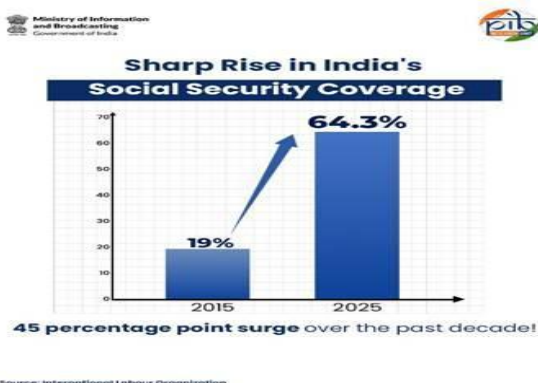

Buddhists to Observe Āshāḍha Pūrṇimā at Sarnath :-

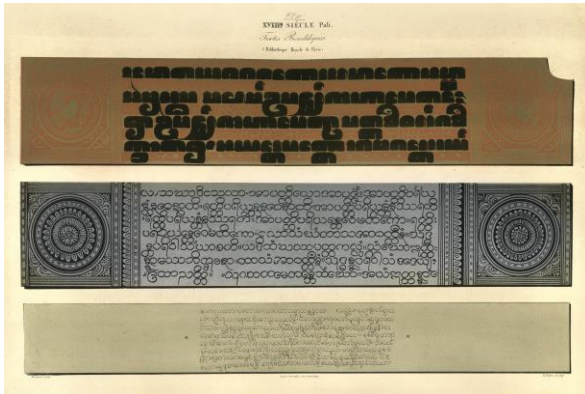

Railways Launches 'RailOne' App for Passenger Services

Union Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw launched the 'RailOne' app, a comprehensive platform for railway passenger services. The app offers unreserved and platform ticket booking, live train tracking, and grievance redressal, among other services. It supports single sign-

on and integrates with existing RailConnect and UTS credentials. The launch aligns with Indian Railways' digital infrastructure goals, and the app is part of initiatives to modernize passenger services, including the development of a new Passenger Reservation System.



I Ministry Proposes Overhaul of TRP Guidelines :-

The Ministry of Information Broadcasting has unveiled draft policy changes aimed at modernizing India's television viewership measurement system. The proposed guidelines, released on July 2, seek to update the outdated Television Rating Points (TRP) system to better reflect current viewing habits across diverse platforms like cable, DTH, and streaming services. This reform is designed to open up the field to multiple agencies, thereby enhancing competition and technology upgrades. Stakeholders are invited to submit feedback by the end of the 30-day consultation period, potentially leading to a more accurate and representative TRP system.

**Govt Urges Use of BIS-Certified Helmets to Ensure Road Safety :-**

In a significant step to enhance road safety, the Ministry of Consumer Affairs has urged the public to use only BIS-certified helmets. With over 21 crore two-wheelers in India, helmet safety is a major concern. Despite mandatory certification under the Motor Vehicles Act, substandard helmets are rampant. BIS has conducted numerous operations, seizing thousands of non-compliant helmets. This initiative, integrated with road safety campaigns, aims to mitigate fatalities. BIS's new app features will help consumers verify licenses, promoting awareness of certified helmets.

**Amarnath Yatra Sees Massive Pilgrim Turnout Amid Enhanced Security :-**

The annual Amarnath Yatra has attracted nearly 48,000 devotees in its first three days, with stringent security measures in place following past security threats. The Shri Amarnathji Shrine Board reported that over 21,000 pilgrims visited the sacred shrine on opening day. The deployment of additional security forces, including CAPFs and local police, underscores the commitment to ensuring a safe pilgrimage. This year's Yatra is set to conclude on August 9, coinciding with the Raksha Bandhan festival.

**NHAI Tightens Norms for Reporting and Blacklisting Loose FASTags :-**

The National Highways Authority of India has strengthened norms for reporting and blacklisting 'Loose FASTags' to enhance tolling efficiency. This move aims to curb misuse and operational disruptions caused by FASTags not affixed to vehicles. With a FASTag penetration rate of over 98%, the initiative seeks to streamline toll operations and ensure seamless travel for

highway users, aligning with India's goal of efficient toll collection.



Semicon India 2025 to Showcase Global Participation and Innovation :-

Semicon India 2025, set to be held in New Delhi, will feature record participation from over 300 companies across 18 countries. The event aims to highlight India's expanding capabilities in the semiconductor sector. With international pavilions and country roundtables, the conference will focus on bilateral partnerships and workforce development. The initiative aligns with India's goal of becoming a global semiconductor powerhouse.



Air 171 Crash Preliminary Report: No Mechanical Faults Found :-

Air India CEO Campbell Wilson stated that the preliminary report on the AI-171 crash found no mechanical or maintenance faults. The Aircraft Accident Investigation Bureau's report confirmed that all mandatory maintenance tasks were completed, and no abnormalities were detected in the take-off roll. Wilson urged against drawing premature conclusions, emphasizing the ongoing investigation. The crash in

Ahmedabad claimed 260 lives, highlighting the need for a thorough inquiry into the incident.



India Launches Talent Hunt for Young Chefs to Blend Tradition with Innovation :-

The PHDCCI, in collaboration with the Ministry of Tourism, has launched the National Young Chef Competition to discover and nurture India's next generation of culinary innovators. Targeting final-year hospitality students, the competition encourages blending traditional Indian culinary practices with contemporary techniques. The initiative aims to preserve India's diverse culinary heritage and expand its global footprint in fine dining. Zonal rounds will be held nationwide, culminating in a grand finale in New Delhi. The competition also addresses declining hospitality education enrollment by promoting career opportunities in the culinary industry.



Air India to Partially Restore International Flights Post-Crash :-

Air India has announced plans to partially restore its international flight schedule after a safety pause following a recent crash. The airline will resume thrice-weekly services between Ahmedabad and London

Heathrow, replacing the current Ahmedabad-London Gatwick route. The crash involving a Boeing 787 Dreamliner had necessitated additional safety checks. Air India aims to fully restore its international operations by October 2025, with gradual adjustments to flight frequencies for destinations in Europe and North America. This move reflects the airline's commitment to safety and service continuity.



UIDAI Launches Portal to Deactivate Aadhaar of the Deceased :-

In a bid to prevent identity fraud, UIDAI has launched a portal for deactivating Aadhaar numbers of deceased individuals. Family members can report deaths via the myAadhaar Portal using the deceased's Aadhaar and Death Registration numbers. This initiative, part of a broader strategy, involves collaboration with state governments and aims to maintain the accuracy of the Aadhaar database, a critical identity tool for Indian residents.



India Intensifies Anti-Narcotics Efforts with Major Drug Seizures in 2024 :-

In a significant crackdown on drug trafficking, India seized narcotics worth ₹25,330 crore in 2024, a 55%

increase from the previous year. The Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB), with expanded operations and inter-agency collaboration, played a pivotal role. Operations, including a joint effort with the Indian Navy and Gujarat Police, led to the confiscation of over 3,100 kg of drugs. The government's comprehensive approach also focuses on rehabilitation through the Nasha Mukh Bharat Abhiyaan, benefiting millions. This reflects India's commitment to a drug-free society, blending enforcement with community participation.



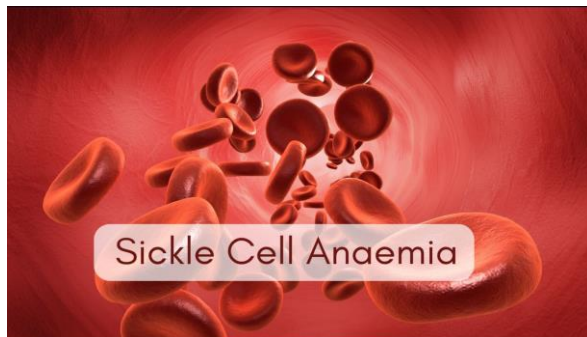
PM Modi Inaugurates Parliament's Monsoon Session with Call for Unity :-

India has successfully completed the screening of over 6 crore individuals for Sickle Cell Anemia under the National Sickle Cell Anaemia Elimination Mission, launched in 2023. This significant achievement aligns with the government's commitment to eradicate the disease by 2047, especially in tribal and high-risk regions. The mission focuses on early diagnosis, genetic counseling, and awareness to prevent the transmission of this hereditary blood disorder.

**Supreme Court Stays Acquittal in 2006 Mumbai Train Bombs Case :-**

The Supreme Court of India stayed the Bombay High Court's acquittal of 12 men convicted in the 2006 Mumbai train bombings. While the court's order does not affect the release of the 12 men, it seeks their responses to the state's appeal. The High Court had overturned their 2015 convictions, citing flawed investigations. The bombings, which occurred on July 11, 2006, left 189 dead and over 800 injured, marking one of India's deadliest terror attacks.

**Kargil Vijay Diwas Padyatra to Commemorate 1999 War Victory :-**

To mark the 26th anniversary of India's victory in the 1999 Kargil War, the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports organised a commemorative padyatra in Drass, Kargil. Led by Union Ministers, the event honored the bravery of Indian soldiers. Participants included youth volunteers, war veterans, and civil society members, symbolizing national unity and gratitude towards the armed forces.

India's SASCI Scheme to Develop Iconic Tourist Destinations :-

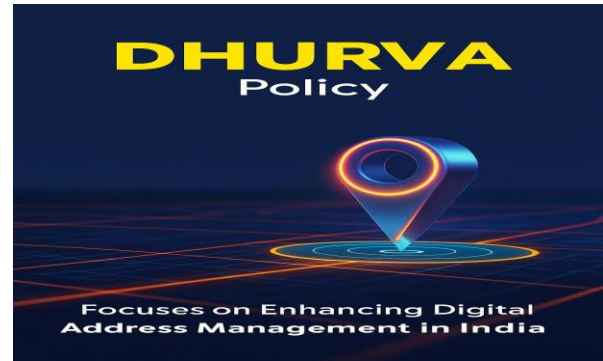

Govt Approves 1.46 Lakh Smart Classrooms Under 'Samagra Shiksha' :-

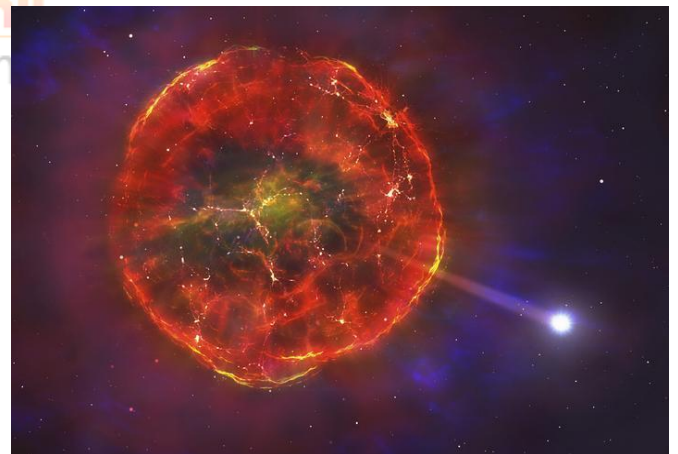

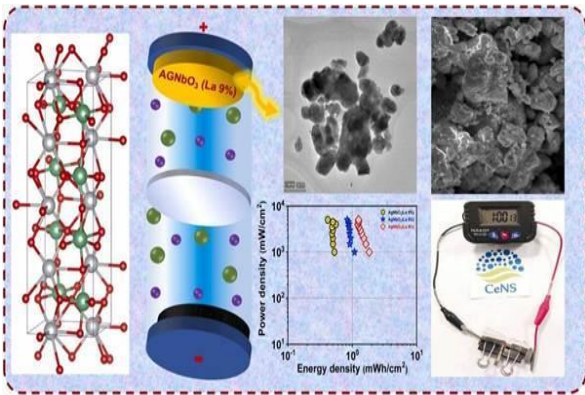
ICMR-AIIMS Study Confirms No Link Between COVID-19 Vaccines and Sudden Deaths :-

The research, spanning 47 hospitals across 19 states, identified pre-existing health conditions and genetic factors as primary causes of unexplained deaths. The findings reinforce the safety of COVID-19 vaccines, emphasizing the importance of vaccination in public health. Officials urge against spreading misinformation that could fuel vaccine hesitancy.



Astronomers Capture Rare Double Detonation Supernova Aftermath :-

In a groundbreaking discovery, astronomers have captured the aftermath of a rare double detonation supernova using the Very Large Telescope in Chile. This event involved a white dwarf star in the Large Magellanic Cloud, located 160,000 light-years from Earth. The supernova's unique double explosion mechanism was confirmed through the presence of two calcium shells in the aftermath. This discovery enhances our understanding of stellar evolution and the cosmic cycle of matter, showcasing the birth of elements like calcium and iron.



Indian Scientists Develop Green Energy Material for Supercapacitors :-

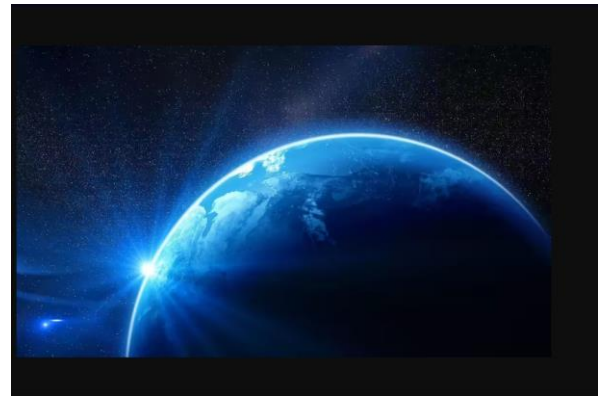
Indian researchers have created a groundbreaking green energy material, lanthanum-doped silver niobate, enhancing supercapacitor performance. Developed by the Centre for Nano and Soft Matter Sciences and Aligarh Muslim University, this innovation increases energy density and efficiency. The material showcased 118% energy retention and 100% coulombic efficiency, marking a significant advancement in energy storage technology. This breakthrough positions India as a leader in sustainable energy solutions, aligning with global efforts for cleaner technologies.



India's First Equine Disease-Free Compartment Recognized Internationally :-

India has established its first Equine Disease-Free Compartment at the RVC Centre in Meerut, recognized by the World Organisation for Animal Health. This facility ensures India's sport horses meet global biosecurity standards, enabling international competition. Scientists discover a 'second Earth' twice the size of our planet near a red dwarf star, 154 light-years :-

This intriguing planet was identified by astronomers using data from NASA's Transiting Exoplanet Survey Satellite (TESS), a mission dedicated to finding planets beyond our solar system. Located about 154 light-years away, TOI-715 b orbits a relatively cool red dwarf star that provides the kind of stable environment often thought to be ideal for potentially habitable worlds.



Meerut Inaugurates Agritech Innovation Hub to Boost Farming Technology :-

Unlike the well-known amyloid and tau proteins, these 'stealth' proteins do not form visible aggregates but may impair brain function. Conducted by Johns Hopkins University, the research offers new insights into neurodegenerative diseases and could lead to novel treatment strategies. The study analyzed over 2,500 protein types in the hippocampus, revealing a strong link between protein misfolding and cognitive decline.



ICMR Develops Indigenous Malaria Vaccine, AdFalcivax, for Dual Protection :-

The Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) is developing an indigenous malaria vaccine, AdFalcivax, targeting two critical stages of the Plasmodium falciparum parasite. This novel vaccine aims to provide

broader protection and reduce community transmission. Early studies show promising results, with potential for long-term immunity and thermal stability. AdFalcivax represents a significant advancement in India's efforts to combat malaria, aligning with the Make in India initiative and showcasing India's capabilities in vaccine development and public health innovation.



Google and OpenAI Achieve Milestone at Global Math Competition :-

SDRF Rescues 40 Devotees Stranded by Landslide in Uttarakhand :-

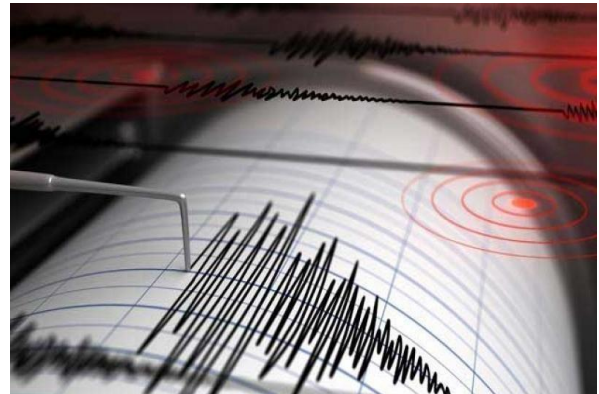

AIIA Hosts Shalyacon 2025: National Seminar on Ayurvedic Surgery :-

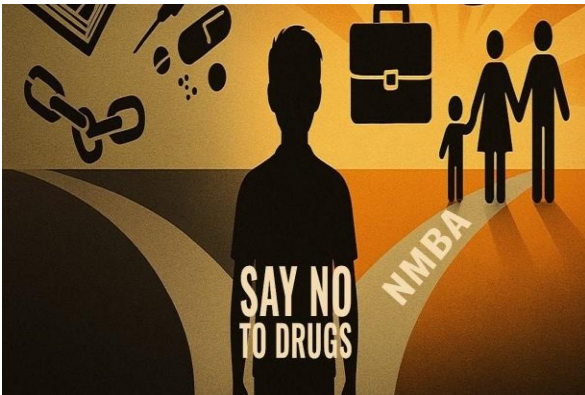

What is India Energy Stack?



Why in the News?

The Union Ministry of Power announced the formation of a task force to design the India Energy Stack (IES) — a new Digital Public Infrastructure (DPI) for the energy sector.

About India Energy Stack (IES):



- Overview: The Ministry of Power launched IES as a Digital Public Infrastructure (DPI) project.
- India's whole energy ecosystem, including producers, grid operators, discoms, customers, regulators, and markets, is to have a single, safe, and interoperable digital backbone.
- Task Force: With REC Ltd serving as the nodal agency and Nandan Nilekani serving as Chief Mentor and RS Sharma as Chair, the task force consists of 17 members.
- Implementation: In states like Delhi, Gujarat, and Maharashtra, a 12-month proof of concept (PoC)

will test important elements including the Utility Intelligence Platform (UIP).

- Greater Impact: It is anticipated to facilitate consumer involvement in energy trading, manage the growing share of renewable energy, and aid India's transition to Net Zero.

Key Features of India Energy Stack:

- Scalability and Integration: In line with India's energy digitization objectives, it facilitates the integration of smart meters, real-time analytics, and battery storage systems.
- Unique IDs: Facilitates easy tracking and verification by offering digital identification for customers, assets, and energy transactions.
- Real-Time Data Sharing: Efficiency and transparency are increased when stakeholders use standardized, consent-based data exchange procedures.
- Open APIs: Promote innovation and empower fintech ecosystems by enabling the integration of third-party solutions.
- Interoperability: Enables connectivity between various state utilities' and regulators' existing disjointed digital platforms.
- Grid monitoring, load forecasting, demand-response, and consumer insights are made possible by the Utility Intelligence Platform (UIP), a modular analytics layer.
- Peer-to-peer energy trading uses a digital marketplace to enable prosumers (consumers and producers) to purchase, sell, or store energy.
- Carbon Offset Tracking: Provides clear and verifiable accounting for emission reductions, supporting environmental compliance.
- Through the use of virtual power plants and smart contracts, decentralized energy management allows communities and small-scale producers to take part in energy markets.

Invisible Exports of India



Why in the News?

As of 2024–25, India's "invisibles" trade—comprising services exports and private money transfers—has not only surpassed its merchandise exports but also emerged as a key stabiliser of the current account deficit.

What are Invisible Exports (in India's context)?

- What it is: International commerce and revenue flows that do not entail the cross-border movement of tangible goods are referred to as invisible exports. Instead of being visible at ports or airports, these transactions are financial or digital.
- Service Types Covered: They include a broad variety of service-based exports, including R&D, financial consulting, accounting and legal services, IT services, and business process outsourcing.
- Incorporating Remittances: In India's Balance of Payments (BoP), private remittances—money paid home by Indians employed overseas—are included in the invisibles.
- BoP Classification: These transactions are listed under the BoP's "Current Account," more precisely under the subcategories of primary income, secondary income, and services.
- Features: Invisible exports depend significantly on skilled human resources, face fewer trade barriers, and don't need shipping like physical exports do.

- Leading Examples: Software and IT-enabled services (provided by companies such as Infosys, TCS, and Wipro), Global Capability Centers, financial and legal services, and services related to education, travel, and health care are among India's main invisible exports.
- Function of Migrant Remittances: One of the main contributors to India's invisible receipts, remittances from migrant workers and non-resident Indians (NRIs) are vital.

Their Contribution in Trade

- Greater Value than Goods Exports: India's gross invisible revenues in 2024–2025 surpassed \$441.8 billion in merchandise exports, totaling \$576.5 billion. Remittances contributed \$135.4 billion, and services alone generated \$387.5 billion, a significant increase from \$26.9 billion in 2003–04.
- Protect Against Trade Deficits: A net invisible surplus of \$263.8 billion helped bring the entire current account deficit down to just \$23.4 billion, bringing much-needed stability, even though the merchandise trade deficit was \$287.2 billion.
- Resilience amid Global Crises: Unlike commercial commerce, invisible exports shown stronger resilience amid significant interruptions such as the 2008 financial crisis, the COVID-19 epidemic, and ongoing geopolitical tensions.
- Human Capital-Driven Growth: India's trained labor force, not its physical infrastructure, is what drives its services exports. India is thriving as the "office of the world," surpassing the conventional designation of "back office."
- Less Policy Dependency: Trade agreements and significant government incentives were not necessary for the growth of invisible exports. Strong provisions pertaining to the service sector are still absent from India's key trade agreements.

Ancient Port Machilipatnam is set for big Revival



Why in the News?

Machilipatnam, once a flourishing ancient port city on India's east coast, is witnessing a major transformation with the construction of a modern Greenfield port.

About Machilipatnam:

- **Alternate Names:** Also known as Masulipatnam, Maisolia, or Manjarika.
- **Geographic Location:** Located in Krishna district, Andhra Pradesh, on the southeastern Coromandel Coast, at the mouth of River Krishna, ~70 km east of Amaravati.
- **Historical Importance:**
 - One of the most significant east coast port cities for ~1,700 years.
 - Played a key role in maritime trade across ancient, medieval, and early modern periods.
- **Global Trade Connections:**
 - Attracted traders from Rome, Arabia, Persia, Southeast Asia, and Europe.
 - Known for exporting high-quality Muslin textiles prized in Roman markets.
 - The term “muslin” likely derives from “Maisolia,” an ancient name of the city.
- **Cultural Contributions:**
 - Known for **Kalamkari art**, a traditional textile art featuring hand-painted or block-printed designs.
- **Dynastic Port Usage:**

- **Satavahanas (1st BCE – 2nd CE):** Used as a major trade gateway.
- **Vishnukundins (4th–6th CE):** Trade wealth supported Buddhist monument construction (e.g., Nagarjunakonda).
- **Qutb Shahis (16th–17th CE):** Transformed it into a global hub for diamonds, muslin, and Kalamkari.
- **Nizams of Hyderabad (18th century):** Controlled the port until partial cession to the British.

• Mentions in Ancient Texts:

- Appears as **Maisolia** in *Periplus of the Erythraean Sea*.
- Listed as **Maisolos** in *Ptolemy's Geographia*.

• Colonial Involvement:

- **Dutch** built a fort in the 17th century.
- **British East India Company** established its first Bay of Bengal factory here in 1611.
- Between 1686–1759, it changed hands among **French, Dutch, and British**; seized by British from the French in 1759.

• Decline of the Port:

- **Anchorage Issue:** Unsuitable for large ships, with anchorage 5 miles offshore.
- **Cyclone Damage:** A severe cyclone in 1779 killed ~20,000 and destroyed Dutch structures.
- **Trade Shift:** Decline due to growing prominence of Madras (Chennai) and Visakhapatnam under British rule.

• Post-Independence Claim:

- In 1947, **7th Nizam of Hyderabad** attempted to reclaim it for sea access to an independent Hyderabad state.

• Modern Revival:

- A **Greenfield port at Manginapudi** is under construction, expected to be operational by 2026.
- Aims to **restore Machilipatnam's historical maritime legacy**.

MoSPI to integrate 8th Economic Census with 16th Population Census



Why in the News?

The Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation (MoSPI) is preparing for India's 8th Economic Census by integrating it with the upcoming 16th Population Census.

About the Economic Census:

- **Conducting Body:** Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation (MoSPI).
- **Purpose:** Creates a detailed database of **non-agricultural economic establishments** in India.
- **Key Data Captured:** Covers location, clustering, ownership, employment size, and type of economic activity.
- **Unorganised Sector Inclusion:** Includes informal units, vital for understanding employment dynamics.
- **Historical Background:**
 - The Visvesvaraya Committee (1925) proposed the Economic Enquiry Committee, which the Bowley-Robertson Committee (1934) established.

- As a result, national statistics systems and the Central statistics Office (CSO) were established in 1951.
- The first census, which focused on non-agricultural units with at least one hired worker, was carried out in 1977 (excluding Lakshadweep).

• Timeline of Economic Censuses:

- 1980, 1990, 1998, 2005, 2013, and 2019–21 (7th Census) were the years that were conducted.
- Integration with the Population Census: The 1981 and 1991 Population Censuses were matched with the second and third rounds.
- 7th Census Status: Completed in 2021, but results are still pending because of problems with the quality of the data caused by COVID.
- Execution Support: For deployment at the local level, MoSPI collaborated with the Common Service Center (CSC) network.

Integration with the 16th Population Census:

- **Objective:** Improve efficiency and reduce costs by leveraging shared field operations.
- **Data Collection:** Enumerators will note household-based economic activity for MoSPI processing.
- **Census Schedule:**
 - **Oct 1, 2026:** Snow-bound and remote regions (e.g., Ladakh, J&K, HP, Uttarakhand).
 - **Mar 1, 2027:** Rest of the country.
- **Preparatory Work:** State and district committees have been formed to plan the 8th Census.

Places in News: Kariyachalli Island



Why in the News?

The Tamil Nadu government, with World Bank support, has launched a ₹50 crore restoration project for the sinking Kariyachalli Island.



About Kariyachalli Island:

- Overview: The Gulf of Mannar Marine National Park contains 21 deserted islands, including Kariyachalli Island.
- It is located between Rameswaram and Thoothukudi, 20 km northeast of Thoothukudi and 4 km south of Sippikulam.
- Consisting of sand dunes, spits, sandy plains, and reef debris, the island is a low-lying landform.
- Biodiversity Hotspot: Found in the coral reef zone of India, it is home to over 4,300 marine species, including the endangered dugong and 132 different types of coral.
- Its coral reefs and seagrass beds give marine life food and shelter, making it an important ecological feature.

- Natural Coastal Shield: Kariyachalli protects the Tamil Nadu coast by acting as a barrier against storms and tsunamis.
- Historical Significance: It helped lessen the effects of the 2004 tsunami in the Indian Ocean.

Why is it sinking?

- Rapid Land Loss: From 20.85 hectares in 1969 to less than 6 ha in 2024, the island has decreased by more than 70%.
- High Tide Erosion: According to a 2025 study from IIT Madras, only 3.14 ha are left at high tide.
- Wave and Sediment Pressure: Erosion is being accelerated by wave action, sediment loss, and a lack of natural coastline protection.
- Impact of Climate Change: The island's natural defenses have been undermined by coral bleaching and rising sea levels.
- Seagrass Depletion: The island's capacity to retain sediments and withstand erosion has decreased due to the loss of seagrass meadows.
- Extreme Weather Events: The island is becoming increasingly susceptible due to the frequent cyclones and hurricanes.
- Future Risk: Kariyachalli might disappear by 2036 if the present pattern persists.

International Treaty on Plant Genetic Resources for FAO



Why in the News?

India has expressed serious concerns over proposed changes to the International Treaty on Plant Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture (ITPGRFA)—popularly known as the Plant Treaty.

About the Plant Treaty, 2001:



- **Adoption:** It was adopted by the FAO on **3rd November 2001** and came into force in **2004**.
- **Purpose:** It governs the **Multilateral System (MLS)** for the **access and benefit-sharing** of Plant Genetic Resources for Food and Agriculture (PGRFA).
- **Key Features:**
 - **Crop Coverage:** Approximately 80% of the world's plant-based food needs are currently met by the 64 key food crops and forages mentioned in Annex I, which are currently part of the MLS.
 - **Mechanism of Access:** A Standard Material Transfer Agreement (SMTA) grants access to these genetic materials for breeding, training, and research purposes.
 - **Benefit-Sharing Approach:** The Treaty, which focuses on promoting biodiversity in developing nations, includes both monetary and non-monetary benefit-sharing measures.
 - **IP Limitations:** It forbids any claims to intellectual property pertaining to the

unprocessed genetic elements that are obtained through the system.

- **Acknowledgment of Farmers' Rights:** It upholds farmers' rights, including the preservation of traditional knowledge, fair benefit distribution, and involvement in national decisions about the use and conservation of PGRFA.

- **India's Participation:** India is a signatory and active participant and implements the Treaty alongside domestic legislation like the Protection of Plant Varieties and Farmers' Rights (PPV&FR) Act, 2001.

Proposed Amendments:

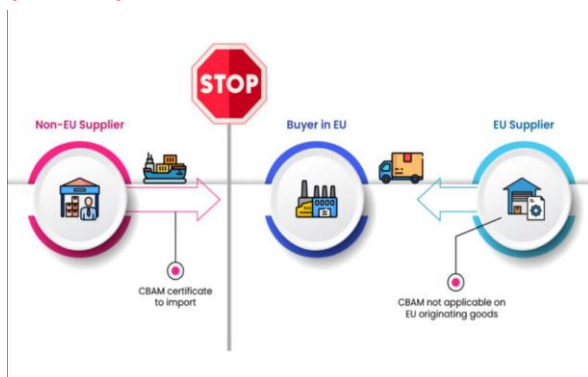
- **Goal:** The next proposal seeks to broaden the MLS's coverage to encompass all PGRFA, not simply those listed in Annex I.
- **New Inclusions:** Under the MLS framework, the expansion would include community-protected heirloom seeds, non-commercial crops, and indigenous variations.
- **Effect on India's Obligations:** Should the change be approved, nations such as India will be required to transfer all plant germplasm via the current SMTA procedure.
- **Benefit Terms Remain the Same:** The current benefit-sharing arrangements, which opponents claim are frequently non-monetary or only symbolic, are preserved in the amendment.
- **IP Rights Concerns:** Repackaging or genetically altering traditional seeds could result in intellectual property loopholes because to the expanded scope.
- **Biopiracy Allegations:** According to critics, the plan permits "backdoor biopiracy," particularly of the abundant seed diversity found in the Global South.

India's Concerns:

- **Loss of Seed Sovereignty:** India worries that its capacity to preserve distinctive plant biodiversity will be weakened if it loses control over which seeds to distribute.

- **Undermining of Farmers' Rights:** The plan may supersede the rights that farmers have under India's PPV&FR Act and the Plant Treaty, which regard them as stewards of the seed heritage.
- **Erosion of National Authority:** Articles 10 and 11 of the Treaty, which provide nations autonomous control over their genetic resources, may be broken by the expansion.
- **Violation of Federal Principles:** Since agriculture is a State issue under Schedule VII of the Constitution, it is believed that the absence of State consultation violates India's federal framework.
- **Marginalization of Biodiversity Boards:** Although State Biodiversity Boards are crucial for governing local germplasm and community rights, their function may be lessened.
- **Absence of Equitable Returns:** India questions the fairness and justice of benefit-sharing, claiming that the global system provides little actual benefits.

Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanisms (CBAM)



Why in the News?

BRICS group has condemned and rejected the European Union's Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism (CBAM) and other similar climate-linked trade measures.

What Is the Carbon Border Adjustment Mechanism (CBAM)?

- **Overview:** The European Union levies this import tax on products whose manufacturing produces

more carbon emissions than are allowed within the EU.

- **The EU's "Fit for 55" climate package,** which includes CBAM, aims to cut greenhouse gas emissions by at least 55% by 2030 compared to 1990 levels.
- **Coverage Area:** The regulation mandates that importers disclose the amount and embedded carbon emissions of specific products, including power, steel, aluminum, cement, fertilizer, hydrogen, and fertilizer.
- **Compliance Mechanism:** EU importers are required to turn in CBAM certificates, which are valued according to the EU Emissions Trading System (ETS), in order to offset these emissions.
- **Carbon Price Adjustment:** The CBAM payment may be reduced if a non-EU producer has already paid a carbon price in their nation.
- **Timeline for Implementation:** The definitive regime of CBAM starts on January 1, 2026, while the transitional phase lasts from 2023 to 2025.

Issues with CBAM:

- **Concerns about Trade Discrimination:** Developing nations, such as China and India, contend that CBAM enforces discriminatory, punitive, and unilateral trade restrictions in the name of environmental preservation.
- **Violation of Climate Agreements:** The Paris Agreement, which supports the idea of shared but distinct obligations, is thought to have been broken.
- **Neglect of Historical Emissions:** Nations in the Global South argue that trade instruments connected to climate change, such as CBAM, disproportionately affect nations that continue to rely on carbon-intensive development while ignoring historical emissions.

Implications of CBAM for India:

- **Effect on Exports:** Under CBAM, Indian exports—especially those of iron, steel, aluminum, and cement—would be subject to more inspection

and carbon costs, which will lower their competitiveness.

- Carbon Taxation Timeline: Starting on January 1, 2026, certain sectors of shipments to the EU will be subject to carbon taxes, which might range from 19.8% to 52.7%.
- High Carbon Intensity Risk: India's products are particularly susceptible to CBAM tariffs because of its high carbon intensity, which is mostly caused by its 75% reliance on coal.

Revising Guidelines to declare Eco-Sensitive Zones (ESZ)



The Standing Committee of the National Board for Wildlife (SC-NBWL) has decided to review and revise the 2011 guidelines on the declaration of Eco-Sensitive Zones (ESZs) around wildlife sanctuaries and national parks.

What are Eco-Sensitive Zones (ESZs)?

- **Overview:** ESZs, also called **Ecologically Fragile Areas (EFAs)**, are areas notified by the **Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change (MoEFCC)** around **Protected Areas (PAs)** like national parks and wildlife sanctuaries.
- **Purpose:**
 - Act as **"shock absorbers"** to protect areas by regulating potentially harmful activities.
 - Serve as **transition zones** from highly protected to less protected ecosystems.

- Help conserve **biodiversity**, maintain **landscape connectivity**, and prevent **fragmentation of habitats**.
- **Legal Basis:**
 - **Environment (Protection) Act, 1986**, particularly Section **3(2)(v)**.
 - **Rule 5(1)** of Environment (Protection) Rules, 1986.
- **Wildlife Conservation Strategy, 2002:** Recommended declaring **10 km radius** around PAs as default ESZ.
- **Demarcation Process:**
 - ESZ boundaries vary in width based on ecological sensitivity and ground realities.
 - **Factors considered:** species presence, migration routes, landscape linkage, human settlements, etc.
- **Activity Zonation:**
 - **Prohibited:** Commercial mining, polluting industries, major hydro projects, wood logging.
 - **Regulated:** Tree felling, large-scale agriculture change, road widening, tourism infrastructure.
 - **Permitted:** Rainwater harvesting, organic farming, green energy use.
- **Present Status:**
 - **347 final notifications** issued.
 - Where no ESZ is notified, a **default 10-km ESZ** is applicable (SC 2022 ruling).

2011 Guidelines on ESZs:

- Issued by MoEFCC to standardize and guide the process of ESZ declaration.
- **Key Features:**
 - Emphasized flexibility and site-specific demarcation.
 - Classified activities into permitted, regulated, prohibited.
 - Directed preparation of a Zonal Master Plan (ZMP) within 2 years of ESZ notification.

- Called for community involvement, scientific input, and buffer management.

Recent Context:

- **Reasons Behind:** Revision One-size-fits-all (**10-km blanket rule**) is not effective:
 - Urban examples: Sanjay Gandhi National Park (Mumbai), Asola Bhatti Sanctuary (Delhi).
 - In Himachal Pradesh, ~65% area already under forest cover.
 - Kerala: Fear of new sanctuary leading to more restrictions.
- **Over-generalized:** Existing guidelines unsuitable for **marine sanctuaries**, need ecosystem-specific norms.

Scientists decode Locust Pheromones for Eco-Friendly Control



Why in the News?

Researchers in China have discovered a method to curb locust swarming by manipulating their pheromones, paving the way for eco-friendly locust control.

What are Locust Swarms?



- Large grasshoppers, locusts may travel 150 km per day in favorable winds, form enormous swarms, and consume up to their entire weight in food each day.
- They are extremely damaging, destroying crops and endangering the supply of food. 35,000 people's worth of food can be consumed everyday by a single swarm.
- The management of locusts in India is supervised by Locust Control and Research (LC&R).
- In states like Rajasthan, Gujarat, Punjab, and Haryana, locust activity is tracked and managed by the Locust Warning Organization (LWO), which was founded in 1939.
- One of the deadliest desert locust outbreaks in decades, the 2019–2022 outbreak devastated nearly 200,000 hectares of crops in East Africa, India, and Pakistan.
- Because locusts can breed quickly, outbreaks are still challenging to control despite current control measures.

About Locust Pheromones:

- **Locust Behavioural Phases:** Locusts exhibit two behavioural phases—solitary (non-swarming) and gregarious (swarming). The shift to gregariousness leads to swarm formation.
- **Key Pheromone – 4-Vinylanisole (4VA):**
 - Identified in 2020 by Chinese researchers.
 - Released from locusts' hind legs after feeding, especially due to the digestion of phenylalanine (a plant compound).
 - Acts as an aggregation pheromone, attracting other locusts and triggering group behaviour.
- **Biochemical Pathway:**
 - Enzymes 4VPMT1 (dominant) and 4VPMT2 convert a precursor molecule (4VP) into 4VA.

- This process is crucial in converting solitary locusts into swarm-forming gregarious ones.

Recent Breakthrough and Its Implication:

- Findings: By genetically inhibiting 4VPMT1, scientists at the Chinese Academy of Sciences were able to stop locusts from generating 4VA and halt the development of swarms.
- Restrictions: Because 4NP is hazardous and persistent in the environment, its widespread use raises questions.

- The suggested approach is to use biopesticides based on RNA interference (RNAi) that target the 4VPMT genes to stop the production of 4VA without being harmful.
- **Wider Implications:**
 - Can reduce reliance on synthetic pesticides, protect crops, and support sustainable agriculture.
 - Offers a precision pest control model based on insect behavioural biochemistry.

Governance

NAKSHA Programme



Why in the News?

The Department of Land Resources (DoLR) under the Ministry of Rural Development is set to launch the second phase of capacity building for the NAKSHA programme (NAtional geospatial Knowledge-based land Survey of urban HABitations).

About NAKSHA Program:



- Overview: On February 18, 2025, it was introduced. The Department of Land Resources (DoLR), Ministry of Rural Development, started the geospatial land survey project as part of the Digital India Land Records Modernization Programme (DILRMP).
- The program's objectives are to streamline urban governance, modernize urban land records, and increase property ownership transparency.
- Funding: It has an estimated cost of ₹194 crore and is entirely financed centrally.
- Significance: In response to India's rapidly expanding urban population—which is predicted to reach 600 million by 2031—the program was started.

Key Features:

- **Pilot Coverage:** Implemented in 157 ULBs covering an area of 4,142.63 sq km, focusing on towns with an area of <35 sq km and a population of <2 lakh.
- **Drone-Based Survey:** Uses drones equipped with LiDAR sensors and 5 cm resolution cameras to conduct aerial surveys.
- **Three-Stage Survey Process:**
 - Drone Survey & Data Collection
 - Field Verification & Draft Mapping
 - Public Review & Finalisation

- **Integration with Legal Records:** Field surveys validate and update property tax, ownership, and registration data.

Child Adoption in India



Why in the News?

In a major step toward digital adoption reform, Central Adoption Resource Authority (CARA) has confirmed that digitally certified adoption orders sent by e-mail are now legally valid under current rules.

Child Adoption in India: Legal Framework and Process

- Adoption in India is governed by **multiple laws**, depending on the religion and category of the child:
 1. Hindus, Jains, Sikhs, and Buddhists are all covered by the 1956 Hindu Adoption and Maintenance Act (HAMA).
 2. Adoption of orphaned, abandoned, and surrendered children is governed by the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015, which is applicable to all religions.
 3. Muslims, Christians, Jews, and Parsis are all covered by the Guardians and Wards Act of 1890, which permits guardianship but not complete adoption.
- **Who can be adopted:**
 - **Children declared legally free** by a Child Welfare Committee (CWC).
 - **Children of relatives** (uncle, aunt, or grandparent).
 - **Stepchildren** surrendered by biological parents.

Who can adopt:

- OCIs, NRIs, Indian citizens, and some foreign nationals (with tight restrictions).
- must be free of life-threatening illnesses and in good mental, physical, and financial health.
- Couples who are married: At least two years of stability in a partnership; a combined age of no more than 110 years.
- Girls cannot be adopted by single men, but any child can be adopted by single women.
- The child and the adoptive parent must be at least 25 years apart in age.
- Unless they are adopting children with special needs, couples with three or more children are typically ineligible.

Adoption Process:

- Registering online using CARA's CARINGS site; submitting documentation and the Home Study Report.
- counseling sessions conducted by authorized organizations.
- Parent-child matching; foster care and acceptance phases.
- The District Magistrate's legal adoption order (post-2021 modification).
- The adoption agency will follow up after two years.

Role of Central Adoption Resource Authority (CARA):

- As the primary regulatory agency for all adoptions in India, CARA is a statutory entity under the Ministry of Women and Child Development.
- CARA was founded in 1990, and in 2015, Section 68 of the JJ Act made it a statutory entity.
- It is the sole body with legal jurisdiction to adopt Indian children both domestically and abroad.

- India, which accepted the Hague Convention in 2003, is the major authority in charge of regulating adoptions abroad.

Key Functions of CARA:

CARA plays a pivotal role in the adoption ecosystem through the following functions:

- **Regulation and Oversight**
 - Monitors all adoptions—**domestic and inter-country**—through licensed agencies.
 - Ensures adoptions are in **compliance with laws and child rights standards**.
- **Platform and Technology:** It operates the **CARINGS portal** (Child Adoption Resource Information and Guidance System) for:
 - Registration of prospective adoptive parents.
 - Tracking adoption progress.
 - Referrals and matching children with parents.
- **Inter-Agency Coordination:** It coordinates with:
 - **State Adoption Resource Agencies (SARAs)**
 - **District Child Protection Units (DCPUs)**
 - **Specialised Adoption Agencies (SAAs)**
 - **Authorized Foreign Adoption Agencies (AFAAs)**
- **Legal and Policy Role**
 - Provides Conformity Certificates and No Objection Certificates (NOC) for international adoptions.
 - Adoption Regulations are drafted and revised (the recent version: 2022).
 - Provides advice and explanations, such as acknowledging adoption orders that have been digitally certified.
- **Promotion of In-country Adoptions**
 - Favors domestic adoption above international adoption, particularly for children who have been abandoned or are orphans.

- starts awareness-raising initiatives to lessen child trafficking and unauthorized adoptions.

- **Post-Adoption Monitoring**

- Ensures the **well-being of adopted children** through follow-up reports for two years.
- Promotes **integration of children into adoptive families** through counseling and support.

- **Policy Innovation and Reforms**

- Oversees the transition from foster care to adoption, particularly in Jammu and Kashmir.
- Agency networks are growing—245 new agencies were added between 2024 and 2025.
- New modules for adopting relatives and stepparents.

CJI assures 'complete transparency' in Collegium System



Why in the News?

Recently, CJI B.R. Gavai affirmed that the collegium system will ensure merit, transparency, and inclusive representation, and will not be swayed by external pressures.

What is the Collegium System?



- **About:** The Collegium System is the process by which judges are appointed and transferred in the **Supreme Court and High Courts of India**.
- **Origin:** It was developed by the **Supreme Court itself** and is **not mentioned in the Constitution**.
- **Purpose:** It aims to ensure judicial independence by minimizing the role of the executive in judicial appointments.
- **Basis for Appointments:**
 - Judges of the Supreme Court: In accordance with Article 124, the President selects judges after conferring with pertinent Supreme Court and High Court judges.
 - High Court Judges: In accordance with Article 217, the President appoints judges after conferring with the Chief Justice of India, the State Governor, and the Chief Justice of the relevant High Court.
- **Structure of the Collegium:**
 - The Chief Justice of India (CJI) and the four seniormost Supreme Court judges make up the Supreme Court Collegium, which has five judges.
 - The Chief Justice of the High Court and the two most senior justices on the court make up the High Court Collegium.

Qualifications for SC Judges:

- **Citizenship:** Must be an **Indian citizen**.
- **Judicial Experience:** At least **5 years as a High Court judge** or **10 years as an advocate** in one or more High Courts.

- **Alternative Route:** Can also be a **distinguished jurist**, in the President's opinion.

Qualifications for HC Judges:

- **Experience:** Must have held a **judicial office for 10 years** or practiced as an **advocate for 10 years** in a High Court.
- **Bar Enrollment:** Must be **enrolled with the Bar Council of India**.

Evolution of the Collegium System:

- The Supreme Court held in the First Judges Case (1981) that the executive had the last say over appointments and that the CJI's judgment was not legally binding.
- Second Judges Case (1993): The Court gave the judiciary precedence and formally established the Collegium System by reinterpreting "consultation" to mean "concurrence."
- Third Judges Case (1998): The CJI and the four seniormost judges were added to the Collegium upon Presidential Reference.

How does it Work?

- Chief Justice of India (CJI) appointment: The departing CJI suggests the successor CJI based on seniority. The PM advises the President after receiving it from the Law Minister.
- High Court Judge Appointment: Started by the Chief Justice of the High Court, authorized by the High Court Collegium, and sent to the Union Law Ministry through the state government.

PARAKH Survey reveals deficits in Student Learning



Why in the News?

The Ministry of Education recently released the PARAKH Rashtriya Sarvekshan (RS) Report, an extensive nationwide student performance assessment for Grades 3, 6, and 9.

About PARAKH:

- Performance Assessment, Review, and Analysis of Knowledge for Holistic Development is the full form of PARAKH.
- As an independent organization under the National Council of Educational Research and Training (NCERT), it was founded in 2023.
- As India's national assessment authority, PARAKH's mission is to harmonize school-level evaluations across boards and states.
- Policy Alignment: The program supports competency-based, equitable, and inclusive learning, which is in line with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020.
- Developing norms, standards, and recommendations for evaluating learning outcomes at the national level is its primary goal.
- **Key Functions:**
 - Board Standardization: PARAKH aims to guarantee that the academic standards of different state and central school boards are equivalent.
 - Assessment Focus: It moves away from rote learning by creating and implementing competency-based examinations.
 - Creating Holistic Progress Cards for the Foundational, Preparatory, Middle, and Secondary levels is the unit's responsibility.
 - Execution of the Survey: To monitor student learning outcomes at scale, it administers large-scale achievement surveys, like as the PARAKH Rashtriya Sarvekshan (RS), which was first introduced in 2021 as the National Achievement Survey (NAS).

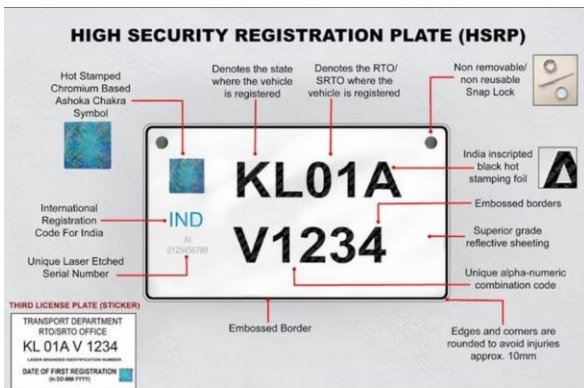
Key Highlights of the PARAKH Rashtriya Sarvekshan (RS) Report – 2024:

- **Scale of the Survey:** Assessed over 21.15 lakh students from Grades 3, 6, and 9, across 74,229 schools in 781 districts.
- **Top performers:** Punjab, Kerala, Himachal Pradesh, Chandigarh, and Dadra & Nagar Haveli and Daman & Diu; low-performing districts were concentrated in Meghalaya, Jharkhand, and Arunachal Pradesh.
 - Although many students had trouble with geometry and spatial reasoning, between 60 and 70 percent of third-graders showed basic reading, vocabulary, and early math skills.
 - Less than 40% of sixth graders were able to comprehend fractions or solve real-world arithmetic problems, demonstrating gaps in conceptual knowledge and application.
 - Less than half of Grade 9 students understood fundamental political and scientific concepts like the Constitution, biodiversity, and electricity; just 28–31% applied percentages or comprehended numerical systems.

High Security Registration Plates (HSRPs)**Why in the News?**

Maharashtra's transport department has now made HSRP number plate mandatory with a final deadline set for 15 August.

What is a High-Security Registration Plate (HSRP)?



- **About:** It is a standardised, tamper-proof vehicle number plate mandated for all vehicles in India.
- **Launch:** It was officially introduced in **2001** under Rule 50 of the **Central Motor Vehicle Rules (CMVR), 1989**, and later made mandatory by the **Supreme Court in 2012**.
- **Composition:** The plate is made of **aluminium** and includes several embedded security features to prevent counterfeiting and enhance traceability.
- **Key Features:**
 - A snap lock that cannot be removed from each HSRP keeps it from being tampered with or reused.
 - A 10-digit unique identifying number that has been laser-etched onto the plate connects it to the vehicle's registration information.
 - To verify the plate and avoid duplicates, a hologram of the Ashoka Chakra made of chromium is incorporated.
 - A retro-reflective material facilitates automated detecting systems and enhances visibility at night.
 - The vehicle's windshield is covered with a third registration sticker that is color-coded and shows important details including the engine, chassis, and registration numbers.
 - Because of the RFID (Radio Frequency Identification) technology included in the plate, authorities can digitally follow

the car for traffic control and enforcement purposes.

Compliance and Enforcement in India:

- All vehicles registered after April 1, 2019, must have HSRPs in accordance with Ministry of Road Transport and Highways (MoRTH) regulations.
- By the dates established by the individual state governments, vehicles registered before to April 1, 2019, must be refitted with HSRPs.
- To improve road safety and reduce vehicle-related crimes, the Supreme Court and the Ministry of Road Transport have instructed governments to severely enforce HSRP installation.
- Section 177 of the Motor Vehicles Act, 1988 and Rule 50 of the CMVR both impose a ₹1,000 fine on non-compliant vehicle owners.
- Transport officials in Maharashtra and other states are directing retrofitting at authorized centers, issuing challans, and conducting daily enforcement activities.
- Vehicle owners must schedule appointments online in advance for HSRP fittings, and certain states have authorized zone-wise providers to expedite installation.

What are Zonal Councils?



Why in the News?

Union Home Minister recently highlighted that **83% of issues discussed in Zonal Council meetings have been resolved**, reaffirming their role as effective platforms for intergovernmental cooperation.

What are Zonal Councils?

- Establishment: They are not constitutional bodies; rather, they are statutory bodies created by the States Reorganisation Act of 1956.
- Promoting coordination and collaboration between states, union territories, and the federal government is their primary objective.
- Natural divides, linguistic and cultural affinities, river systems, and security requirements served as the foundation for the zoning process.
- **Zonal Division:** India is divided into **five zones**—Northern, Central, Eastern, Western, and Southern—with a separate **Zonal Council** for each:

1. **Northern Zonal Council:** Haryana, Himachal Pradesh, Jammu & Kashmir, Punjab, Rajasthan, Delhi, Chandigarh
2. **Central Zonal Council:** Chhattisgarh, Uttarakhand, Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh
3. **Eastern Zonal Council:** Bihar, Jharkhand, Odisha, West Bengal
4. **Western Zonal Council:** Goa, Gujarat, Maharashtra, Dadra & Nagar Haveli, Daman & Diu
5. **Southern Zonal Council:** Andhra Pradesh, Karnataka, Kerala, Tamil Nadu, Puducherry

Note:

- Assam, Arunachal Pradesh, Manipur, Tripura, Mizoram, Meghalaya, Nagaland, and Sikkim are members of the North-Eastern Council (NEC), a distinct entity that was added in 2002.
- None of the Zonal Councils include the Andaman and Nicobar Islands and Lakshadweep, which are union territory. They currently receive special invitations to the Southern Zonal Council, nevertheless.

Composition and Structure of Zonal Councils:

- Chairperson: The Union Home Minister serves as the chair of each Zonal Council.

- State Representation: The Council is composed of the chief ministers of each state in the corresponding zone.
- Additional Members: Two more ministers are nominated by each state, and administrators of union areas also take part.
- The Vice-Chairperson Function: Every year, the Chief Ministers alternate in the position of Vice-Chairperson.
- Standing Committees: These are established in collaboration with state chief secretaries and convene prior to regular sessions in order to determine the agenda.

Functions and Responsibilities:

- Cooperation & Consensus: Encourage conversation and consensus-building to advance interstate and center-state cooperation.
- Key topics covered include border disputes, interstate transportation, linguistic minority issues, economic and social planning, and more.
- Advisory Role: Although the councils' suggestions are merely suggestions, they are extremely important for resolving conflicts and coordinating the creation of policies.

Recent Developments and Significance:

- Leadership in NEC: A move toward greater integration was signaled in 2018 when the Union Home Minister was appointed Chairperson of the North Eastern Council.
- Revitalization under the Modi administration: Instead of being passive advising bodies, zonal councils have changed into vibrant, action-oriented forums.
- Federalism is being strengthened by these councils, which now actively support cooperative federalism, settle conflicts, and promote regional development.
- Efficacy in Implementation: Zonal Councils are demonstrating a growing political will and efficacy in tackling regional concerns, as seen by the resolution of 83% of agenda items.

TALASH Initiative



Why in the News?

The National Education Society for Tribal Students (NESTS) and UNICEF India launched TALASH (Tribal Aptitude, Life Skills and Self-Esteem Hub), a first-of-its-kind national initiative for holistic development of tribal students in Eklavya Model Residential Schools (EMRSs).

About the TALASH Initiative:

- **Overview:** In collaboration with UNICEF India, the National Education Society for Tribal Students (NESTS) established the nationwide initiative known as TALASH (Tribal Aptitude, Life Skills and Self-Esteem Hub).
- The target group is indigenous kids enrolled in Eklavya Model Residential Schools (EMRSs) around the nation, with an emphasis on their overall development.
- **Goals:** The program helps tribal adolescents develop self-awareness, emotional fortitude, life skills, and a clear professional path.
- **Focus:** It is India's first nationwide program created especially for pupils from tribal communities.
- **Broader Policy:** By supporting inclusive, equitable, and competency-based education, TALASH supports the National Education Policy 2020.
- **Coverage Objective:** It is anticipated that more than 1,38,336 students from 28 States and 8 Union Territories will gain.

- **Implementation:** TALASH intends to be deployed in every EMRS across the country by the end of 2025.

Key Features of TALASH:

- **Psychometric Assessments:**
 - Inspired by NCERT's 'Tamanna', TALASH offers aptitude tests to help students discover their interests, abilities, and potential.
 - Based on the results, students receive Career Cards suggesting suitable career options.
- **Career Counselling:** The platform offers structured career guidance to help students make informed decisions aligned with their strengths and aspirations.
- **Life Skills & Self-Esteem Modules:** TALASH teaches communication, problem-solving, emotional regulation, and self-confidence through interactive modules.
- **E-Learning for Teachers:**
 - A dedicated online portal provides training and resources to teachers to help them mentor students effectively.
 - So far, 189 teachers from 75 EMRSs have been trained to lead school-level sessions.

Sanchar Mitra Scheme



Why in the News?

The Department of Telecommunications (DoT) has launched an expanded Sanchar Mitra Scheme to engage engineering students as digital ambassadors for

- **Implementation Status:**
 - Piloted in select institutions.
 - Now being scaled up for nationwide rollout.

Key Features and Highlights:

- Students with technical and engineering backgrounds, such as those in computer science, electronics, cybersecurity, and telecommunications, are its main target audience.
- **Volunteer Selection:** After consulting with DoT field units and educational institutions, students will be nominated as Sanchar Mitras.
- **Training Modules:** Volunteers will receive instruction on how to run community-based

campaigns about preventing cyber fraud, EMF radiation, and appropriate online conduct.

- **Training Institutions:** The DoT's Media Wing and the National Communications Academy–Technology (NCA-T) will provide training.
- **Promotion of Tech Awareness:** Sanchar Mitras will raise awareness of cutting-edge telecommunications technologies like cybersecurity, AI, 5G, and 6G.
- **Community Outreach:** To promote an informed digital citizenship culture, students will interact with local communities, non-governmental organizations, and educational institutions.
- **Strategic Alignment:** It complements India's strengths in the "Four Ds": delivery, digitization, democracy, and demography.

Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) of India



Why in the News?

The Comptroller and Auditor General of India’s (CAG) audit has flagged ₹573 Crore irregularities in Indian Railways.

About Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) of India:



- **Foundation:** Founded in accordance with Article 148 of the Indian Constitution.
- **Independence:** A constitutional power that is unaffected by the executive.
- **Appointment:** Selected by the Indian President.
- **Tenure:** Serves for six years or until the age of sixty-five, whichever comes first.
- **Removal:** The President may dismiss someone in the same way and for the same reasons as a Supreme Court of India judge.
- **Post-Retirement Bar:** After leaving office, you are not eligible to hold any more positions with the Indian or any state government.
- **Funding:** To ensure financial independence, administrative costs are deducted from the Consolidated Fund of India.
- **Parliamentary Independence:** The CAG cannot be represented in Parliament by any minister.
- **Function:** regarded as the protector of the public coffers and a fundamental element of Indian democracy.

Powers and Functions:

- **Audits:**

- **Audits of Funds:** Examines spending from the Union Territory, State, and Consolidated Funds of India.
- **Audits of other funds:** both federal and state audits of public accounts and contingency funds.
- **Departmental audits:** Examine government departments' balance sheets, subsidiary accounts, and profit and loss statements.
- **Authority Audits:** Examines organizations and authorities that get significant funding from the government.
- **Accounts of corporations and companies** held by the government are examined through company audits.

- **Special Audits:** Conducts audits of other authorities upon request from the governor or president.
- **Parliamentary Role:** Serves as the Public Accounts Committee of Parliament's advisor, confidante, and thinker.
- **Public Accountability:** Revealed significant frauds, including the coal block allocation and 2G spectrum instances.
- **Sectoral Reviews:** Draw attention to inefficiencies in state enterprises such as railroads and the defense sector.

Issues with the Comptroller and Auditor General:

- **Absence of Real-Time Control:** Checks can be issued without CAG's prior approval; withdrawals from the Consolidated Fund cannot be stopped or approved.
- **Appointment Opaque:** There are no set requirements or open selection processes; appointments are made under complete executive supervision.
- **Limited Audit Scope:**
 - Excludes several government organizations, such as public sector banks and the Life Insurance Corporation.
 - cannot audit public-private partnerships or funds such as the Prime Minister's National Relief Fund and the Prime Minister's Citizen Assistance and Relief in Emergency Situations Fund.
 - The audit's purview does not extend to off-budget borrowings (such as those made through the National Investment and Infrastructure Fund).
- **Post-Facto Nature:** Audits occur after expenditure, limiting preventive or real-time oversight.

History

Dalai Lama and His Reincarnation



Why in the News?

Turning 90 on July 6, 2025, the 14th Dalai Lama gave his clearest message yet that the Dalai Lama lineage will continue, challenging China's stance.

Who is the Dalai Lama?

- **Spiritual Head:** The most powerful school of Tibetan Buddhism, the Gelug (Yellow Hat) school, is headed by the Dalai Lama.
- **Meaning:** Originally bestowed by Mongol emperor Altan Khan in the 16th century, the title "Dalai Lama" translates to "Ocean of Wisdom."
- **Function:** He is regarded as the human reincarnation of Avalokiteshvara, the Bodhisattva of Compassion.

Tenzin Gyatso: the 14th Dalai Lama:



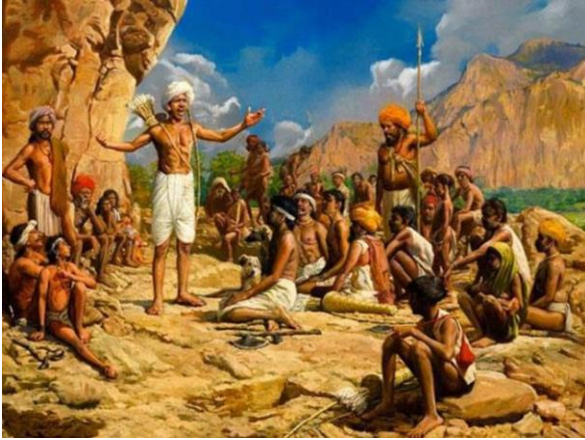
- **Early Life:** Tenzin Gyatso, the 14th Dalai Lama, was born in Taktser, Tibet, in 1935. He was recognized in 1939 and enthroned in 1940.
- **Exile to India:** He created the Tibetan Government-in-Exile in Dharamsala after seeking sanctuary in India in 1959 when China occupied Tibet.
- **Political Transition:** He kept his spiritual function but ceded political control to an elected leader of the Tibetan Parliament-in-Exile (TPiE) in 2011.
- **Global Peace Advocate:** A well-known advocate for secular ethics and interfaith cooperation, he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1989 for his nonviolent campaigning.

Key Notes on Tibetan Buddhism:

- **Theology:** Tibetan Buddhism combines Bon customs, Tantric (Vajrayana) rituals, and Mahayana philosophy.
- **Four major schools** are included: Nyingma, Kagyu, Sakya, and Gelug. Je Tsongkhapa established the Gelug school in the fourteenth century.
- **Reincarnation System:** The Tulku system includes leaders who are thought to be reincarnated instructors, such as the Karmapa and Panchen Lama.
- **Textual Foundation:** The Tengyur (scholarly commentary) and Kangyur (Buddha's teachings) are essential works.
- **Meditation Traditions:** Dzogchen and Mahamudra are two techniques that emphasize understanding the fundamental nature of the mind.
- **Institutional Legacy:** Important hubs for ritual and education include monasteries like Ganden, Tashi Lhunpo, and Drepung.
- **Global Impact:** Tibetan Buddhism is thriving throughout the Himalayas and is spreading

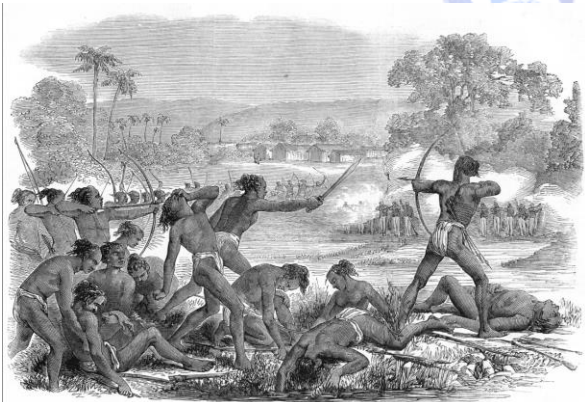
around the world, particularly in Western nations.

170th Anniversary of Santhal Revolt



Why in the News?

Jharkhand observed 'Hul' Diwas to commemorate the rebellion's 170th anniversary of Santhal Revolt which was held on June 30, 1855.



About the Santhal Revolt:

- Overview: Celebrated annually as Hul Diwas, the Santhal Hul (Revolt) started on June 30, 1855, in what is now Jharkhand.
- The word "Hul," which means "revolution," refers to one of the first coordinated rebellions against British domination in India, predating the 1857 Revolt.
- Associated Leaders: 32 distinct tribal and non-tribal communities supported it, and its leaders were Sidho, Kanho, Chand, Bhairav Murmu, and the sisters Phulo and Jhano.
- Nature of the Revolt: The Santhal Hul was mostly an agrarian rebellion that was not motivated by

religion or elite politics. It was distinguished by tribal cohesiveness and guerrilla fighting.

• Causes:

- Landlord Exploitation: It attacked moneylenders who took advantage of tribal tribes, the British East India Company, and the Zamindari system.
- The British established the Damin-i-Koh Policy in the Rajmahal Hills in 1832 with the goal of resettling Santhals from Bengal and Jharkhand so they could clear forests and start farming.
- Alienation: Santhals faced persecution from the Zamindari-court-police nexus, forced labor (such as kamioti and harwahi), usurious debt traps, and land alienation.

- Suppression measures: Sidho and Kanho were slain in action when the British declared martial law on November 10, 1855, and used war elephants and contemporary weapons to put an end to the rebellion by January 3, 1856.
- Persistent resistance: During the Sepoy Mutiny of 1857, tribal rebellions persisted in places like Hazaribagh and Manbhum (present-day Dhanbad and Purulia) even after they were put down.

Key Outcomes of the Revolt:

- The Santhal Pargana Tenancy Act (1876) safeguarded Santhal self-governance, permitted inheritance according to tribal norms, and prohibited property transfers to non-Adivasis.
- Motivated by subsequent tribal protests, the Chhotanagpur Tenancy Act (1908) limited the sale of tribal and Dalit land and necessitated the consent of the collector for property transfers within the caste and locality.
- Tribal Identity Impact: Tribal consciousness, legal land protections, and anti-colonial resistance legacies were all influenced by the uprising.
- The Santhals, who are currently the third-largest tribal community in India and who reside in

Jharkhand, Bihar, Odisha, and West Bengal, preserve the Santhali language by using the "Ol Chiki" script.

Who were the Girmitiyas?



Why in the News?

PM Narendra Modi, while speaking in Trinidad and Tobago, paid tribute to the Girmitiyas—19th-century indentured Indian labourers who helped shape Indo-Caribbean culture.

About Girmitiyas:



- Overview: The word "Girmitiya" is derived from the word "agreement," which Indian laborers who signed contracts to work overseas pronounced as "gimit."
- Origin of the Workers: The majority of Girmitiyas were hired from Bihar and eastern Uttar Pradesh, particularly from regions that were experiencing hunger or poverty.
- Language and Community: These laborers were from agricultural castes and communities and spoke Hindi, Awadhi, or Bhojpuri as their primary languages.

- Recruitment agents' role: Arkatis, or agents, lured workers with promises of high pay while concealing the hard realities of plantation life.
- Migration Scale and Scope: More than 1.2 million Indians were transported to British territories, including Mauritius, Fiji, Trinidad & Tobago, Guyana, South Africa, and Suriname, between 1834 and 1920.
- Cultural Continuity Abroad: In the Caribbean, Girmitiyas maintained Indian languages, religious customs, and cultural manifestations like Ramleela despite having few possessions.

Indentured Labour System: A New Form of Slavery:

- Post-Abolition Labour Need: To address the need for plantation workers following the abolition of slavery in 1834, the British established the Indian Indentured Labour System.
- Contract Terms and Reality: Despite the five-year agreement, workers frequently faced deception, endured subpar working conditions, and were unable to switch companies.
- Criminalization of Movement: Workers may be arrested for vagrancy if they are discovered outside the plantation without proper documents.
- Punitive Wage Deductions: The system was exploitative due to strategies like the "double-cut" system, which reduced two days' salary for a single day of absence.
- Wage Withholding: In order to postpone repatriation and keep workers in a state of financial reliance, employers frequently withheld wages.
- Gender Exploitation: According to research by academics like Kamala Kempadoo, women were sexually abused and subjected to salary discrimination. They were also underrepresented and frequently brought in for demographic balance.
- Historians' Critique: In his 1974 book, historian Hugh Tinker famously referred to it as "a new

system of slavery," despite colonial officials calling it a "Great Experiment."

Gandhiji's Campaign Against Indenture:

- Early Opposition: While practicing law in South Africa, Mahatma Gandhi saw firsthand how the system was abused and became opposed to it.
- Malaviya's Blocked Attempt: The British colonial authorities rejected Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya's 1917 attempt to submit an abolition law.
- Protest Strategy: Gandhi started an all-India movement and rallied support through public gatherings, the media, and moral advocacy.
- Interaction with the British: Gandhi visited with Lord Chelmsford, the viceroy, and rallied national leaders against the practice.
- Lastly, Abolition: On July 31, 1917, indentured labor was officially abolished as a result of growing public outcry.
- Moral Significance: According to Gandhi's later essay in *My Experiments with Truth*, the triumph symbolized India's spiritual and moral awakening during peaceful protest.

- In many parts of India, Persian continued to be the court language until the late 19th century. English, Persian, and Urdu were still employed in courts in Oudh and the North-Western Provinces by 1861.
- Due to a lack of standardized terminology and administrative recognition, Hindi found it difficult to establish itself.
- In the 1890s, British official Antony MacDonnell started advocating Devanagari over Persian script.
- Inspired by the motto "Hindi, Hindu, Hindustan," Maharaja Lakshmeshwar Singh of Darbhanga made Hindi the official language of his territory on July 14, 1888.

About Nagari Pracharini Sabha:



- Establishment: On July 16, 1893, Shyamsundar Das, Pandit Ramnarayan Mishra, and Shivkumar Singh established the Nagari Pracharini Sabha at Queen's College in Varanasi.
- Early Patronage: Babu Radhakrishna Das, a cousin of Bharatendu Harishchandra, a prominent figure in contemporary Hindi literature, provided the Sabha with its first backing.
- Organizational Presence: It has branches in Haridwar and New Delhi in addition to its headquarters in Varanasi.
- Primary Mission: During a time when Persian, Urdu, and English predominated, the Sabha sought to advance the Hindi language and

In news: Nagari Pracharini Sabha



Why in the News?

As language debates rise in Maharashtra and Tamil Nadu, the historic Nagari Pracharini Sabha, key to promoting Hindi and Devanagari, quietly resumed its work after decades.

Hindi Under the British: A Language in Waiting

Devanagari script in literature, education, and governance.

- **Library Establishment:** The Arya Bhasha Pustakalaya, India's largest Hindi library, was founded in 1896.
- **Launch of the Research magazine:** In 1896, it also started publishing the Nagari Pracharini Patrika, which is currently regarded as the oldest and most reputable Hindi research magazine in India.
- **Cultural Contributions:** Prior to its eventual transfer to Banaras Hindu University, it oversaw the Bharat Kala Bhavan museum.
- **Modern Revival:** In 2023, under the direction of Vyomesh Shukla, it was brought back to life after years of inactivity and disagreements, as a result of an Allahabad High Court ruling.

Its Role in Hindi Promotion:

- **Linguistic Standardization:** It laid the foundation for a standardized Hindi language by conducting surveys in both rural and urban areas to gather regional vocabulary.
- **Lexicographic Landmark:** Shabd Sagar, an 11-volume Hindi dictionary and significant lexicographical accomplishment, was published in 1929 as a result of this endeavor.
- **Literary Influence:** In 1900, it launched Saraswati magazine, which was edited by Mahavir Prasad Dwivedi and had a significant impact on the development of contemporary Hindi writing.
- **Preservation of Classics:** It ensured the preservation of Hindi literary history by producing critical editions of poems by authors such as Surdas, Tulsidas, Kabirdas, Bihari, and Bhushan.
- **By the early 20th century,** Hindi in Devanagari script was recognized as an official language in the North-Western Provinces and Oudh thanks to the Sabha's efforts.
- **Impact on Civil Service Policy:** It played a key role in requiring fluency in Hindi and Urdu for government employment in the United Provinces.

- **National Literary Conferences:** It provided Hindi with a pan-Indian literary platform in 1910 by assisting in the organization of the first Akhil Bharatiya Hindi Sahitya Sammelan.
- **National Leaders' Support:** The Sabha's mission was supported by Motilal Nehru, Madan Mohan Malaviya, Lala Lajpat Rai, Bal Gangadhar Tilak, and Mahatma Gandhi, demonstrating its pivotal position in the Hindi cause.

In news: Mangal Pandey (1827-1857)



Why in the News?

The Prime Minister paid tribute to the great freedom fighter Mangal Pandey on his birth anniversary.

Who was Mangal Pandey?

- **Birth:** In Nagwa village, Ballia district, Uttar Pradesh, on July 19, 1827.
- **Military Service:** Enlisted in the 34th Bengal Native Infantry at Barrackpore in 1849 as a sepoy in the British East India Company's army.
- **Trigger of Revolt:** Disapproved of the usage of Enfield rifle cartridges lubricated with pig and calf fat, which was considered to be against religious doctrine.
- **Rebellion:** On March 29, 1857, sepoys were incited to mutiny by attacks on British commanders.
- **Punishment:** Arrested, put on trial, and hanged on April 8, 1857.
- **Legacy:** Known as a symbol of resistance and the "Hero of the First War of Indian Independence."

1857 War of Independence

- **Overview:** The First War of Indian Independence or the Great Rebellion of 1857.
- **Sepoy Composition:** Indians made up over 87% of the British Indian Army but faced severe discrimination.
- **Root Causes:**
 - Military dissatisfaction includes unfair compensation, limited opportunities for advancement, and denial of benefits.
 - Religious Insensitivity: Using cartridges lubricated with pig fat was offensive to Muslim and Hindu faiths.
 - Economic hardship includes high land taxes, a drop in traditional crafts, and an increase in joblessness.
 - Political grievances include the imposition of restrictive laws and the annexation of Indian states.
- **Outbreak:**
 - **Barrackpore:** Mangal Pandey's defiance on 29 March 1857 marked the beginning.

- **Meerut:** On 10 May 1857, sepoys rebelled after refusing cartridges and were imprisoned.
- **Delhi:** Rebels marched to Delhi and declared Bahadur Shah II as Emperor.

- **Spread of Revolt:** Uprising expanded to Kanpur, Lucknow, Jhansi, Bihar, Bareilly, Faizabad, and beyond.
- **Mass Participation:** Involved sepoys, peasants, landlords, and regional rulers.

Suppression and Its Aftermath:

- **Cruel Suppression:** By 1859, the rebellion had been put down, and in September 1857, Delhi had been retaken.
- **Administrative Shift:** The British Raj began when the British East India Company was shut down and India came under the direct control of the British Crown.
- **Military Reorganization:** To stop future uprisings, the army's representation of Indians was decreased and restructured.
- **Increased Repression:** Following the uprising, racial discrimination and strict laws became more prevalent.

International Relations

WTO Agreement on Safeguards (AoS)**Why in the News?**

Invoking the Agreement on Safeguards (AoS), India has notified the WTO of its plan to impose \$724 million in retaliatory tariffs on the U.S. for breaching trade commitments through unilateral auto import duties.

What is the Agreement on Safeguards (AoS)?

- **Overview:** This World Trade Organization (WTO) convention permits nations to impose short-term trade restrictions, known as safeguard measures, in cases where an increase in imports negatively impacts a domestic industry.

- **Goal in Practice:** By providing legal protection instruments and safeguards against misuse, the agreement upholds international trade discipline.
- **System Based on Rules:** In order to prevent abuse for long-term protectionism, the agreement guarantees that safeguard actions are open, time-bound, and non-discriminatory.
- **Key Rules:**
 - Article 12.3: A nation must notify and confer with other WTO members who might be impacted by the safeguard prior to taking any action.
 - Article 8: The impacted nation may retaliate by suspending trade advantages equivalent to the loss it sustained if consultation is unsuccessful.
 - Prohibition of Informal Restrictions: To ensure equity, AoS firmly forbids voluntary export restrictions or informal quotas that circumvent WTO regulations.

India's Use of the AoS – The 2025 U.S. Tariff Case:

- **Trigger:** In March 2025, the United States slapped 25% tariffs on automobiles and parts of Indian origin, which India argues are safeguard measures masquerading as unilateral duties.
- **Rule Violation:** India claims that the United States violated both the AoS and the GATT 1994 regulations by failing to adhere to Article 12.3 (required consultations).
- **Impact on Indian shipments:** India says that the U.S. collected roughly \$723.75 million in duties, matching India's intended retaliation, and that the affected shipments totaled \$2.89 billion.
- India argues that this action is not protectionist and is lawful under WTO regulations. It also seeks to protect its export interests while maintaining trade negotiations with the United States.

India's Changing Role in WTO Safeguard Policy:

- **Early Strategy (1995–2010):** India was initially cautious at the WTO, accepting tough terms under TRIPS, GATS, and AoA, and rarely used legal tools like retaliation, focusing more on diplomatic solutions.
- **Recent Assertiveness (Post-2010):** India now actively invokes WTO rules like AoS to protect its interests and has won key disputes—such as:
 - The solar panel case against the U.S.
 - Legal challenges to EU's export restrictions on food.
- **Global Leadership Role:** India has taken the lead among developing countries to protect food security rights and push for fairer global trade terms, especially at Bali (2013) and Nairobi (2015) WTO summits.

Operation Med Max



Why in the News?

The Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) has busted a global drug network spanning four continents through secret Operation Med Max.

Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB)

- **Institutional Mandate:** Under the Ministry of Home Affairs, the NCB serves as India's primary narcotics law enforcement and intelligence organization.
- It was founded on November 14, 1985, in accordance with the 1985 Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act.
- **Function:** The organization collaborates closely with the US DEA, State Police, Intelligence

Bureau, Customs, and foreign organizations like Interpol.

- **International Treaty Compliance:** The NCB is in charge of keeping an eye on India's adherence to international drug control agreements and promoting collaboration with other law enforcement agencies.
- **Operational Network:** It employs direct recruits, paramilitary personnel, IRS officers, and IPS officers to man its zonal offices around the country.
- **Focus on Digital Intelligence:** The organization is now pursuing cyber surveillance, focusing on online drug trafficking, darknet networks, and cryptocurrency-based payments.

About Operation Med Max:



- **Launch:** The Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) started it in May 2024 when it intercepted a car

in Delhi and found 3.7 kg of Tramadol tablets inside.

- **Discovering an International Syndicate:** According to investigations, a worldwide drug gang smuggled controlled medicinal pharmaceuticals over four continents and more than ten countries using drop shipping, encrypted applications, and cryptocurrency payments.
- **Worldwide Consequences:** The investigation led to international enforcement operations, such as the identification of a drug kingpin located in the United Arab Emirates, the shutdown of an illicit pill factory in Australia, and the arrest of a money launderer in Alabama (USA).

Also in News: Operation MELON

- **Overview:** The top-rated darknet drug distributor in India, known as "Ketamelon," who had been operating for more than two years, was the target of a concerted raid.
- During the raid, 1,100 LSD blots, 131 grams of ketamine, and ₹70 lakh worth of bitcoin that was kept in a hardware wallet were seized.
- **Darknet Threat:** Ketamelon's classification as a Level 4 darknet vendor—the highest ranking—highlights the growing threat of cyber-narcotics and the technical ability of NCB to combat it.

Polity

Vice-President of India



Why in the News?

The Vice-President of India, Jagdeep Dhankhar resigned citing health reasons, creating a rare mid-term vacancy in India's second-highest constitutional office.

What happens if VICE-PRESIDENT resigns?

- In his absence, the Rajya Sabha is presided over by the Deputy Chairman. An "acting" vice president is not provided for.
- The election of the vice president must take place "as soon as possible," in contrast to the

president, whose vacancy must be filled within six months.

- The schedule will be announced by the Election Commission.
- The Presidential and Vice-Presidential Elections Act of 1952 governs the election.
- Not the rest of Dhankhar's tenure, but the entire five-year term will be served by the elected candidate.

About Vice-President of India

- **Position:** Second-highest constitutional post; deputy to the President.
- **Parliamentary Role:** Serves as ex-officio Chairman of the Rajya Sabha.
- **Succession:** Ranks second in order of precedence and first in line to become President.
- **Membership:** Is a member of Parliament, not directly elected by the people.
- **Qualifications:**
 - **Citizenship:** Must be a citizen of India.
 - **Age:** Minimum 35 years.
 - **Office of Profit:** Should not hold any.
 - **Parliamentary Eligibility:** Must qualify for election to Rajya Sabha (unlike President, who must qualify for Lok Sabha) due to the VICE-PRESIDENT's role in the Upper House.
- **Roles and Responsibilities:**
 - **Rajya Sabha Chairmanship:** Presides over sessions and ensures order.
 - **Bill Classification:** Refers money bills to the Lok Sabha Speaker.
 - **No Independent Powers:** Has no executive or legislative powers unless acting as President.

Election Procedure:

- **Constitutional Basis:** Governed by Article 66.
- **Electoral College:** Comprises 543 Lok Sabha MPs, 233 elected Rajya Sabha MPs, and 12 nominated Rajya Sabha members.

- **Voting Method:** *Proportional representation* by single transferable vote and secret ballot.
- **No Whip Allowed:** Parties cannot issue voting whips.
- **Conduct:** Managed by the Election Commission; Returning Officer is the **Secretary-General** of either House (on rotation).
- **Winning Quota:** Requires **50% of valid votes + 1**; votes are transferred in rounds if no candidate secures majority in the first round.

Resignation and Removal:

- **Resignation**
 - Article 67(a): The Vice President notifies the President of his or her resignation. The resignation becomes effective immediately upon acceptance and does not require parliamentary confirmation.
 - Not Acting VICE-PRESIDENT: An acting vice president is not provided for under the Constitution.
 - The deputy chairman of the Rajya Sabha, who is now Harivansh Narayan Singh, preside in the absence of the vice president.
 - For instance, after V.V. Giri and R. Venkataraman, Dhankhar, who assumed office in 2022, is only the third vice president in Indian history to leave office before serving out his entire term.
- **Removal**
 - Article 67(b): The Rajya Sabha notice period for removal is 14 days.
 - A simple majority in the Lok Sabha and an effective majority in the Rajya Sabha are required for voting.
 - No Grounds Listed: The Constitution makes no mention of any particular grounds for removal.
 - Judicial Immunity: Article 122 prohibits courts from interrogating removal-related parliamentary procedures.

- Absence of precedent So yet, no vice president has been ousted.

Why in the News?

The ongoing Supreme Court hearings on the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) of electoral rolls in Bihar have reignited discussions on the legal status of the 'right to vote' in India.

About Right to Vote in India:

- **Overview:** It is also known as **suffrage**, allows citizens to elect their representatives in democratic institutions.
- **Constitutional Basis:** Guaranteed under **Article 326** of the Constitution of India, which provides for universal adult franchise.
- **Eligibility:** Every citizen of India **aged 18** and above is entitled to vote, **unless disqualified** by law.
- **Supervision:** Organised and overseen by the Election Commission of India.
- **Supporting Laws:**

- **Representation of the People Act, 1950:** Defines voter eligibility and grounds for disqualification.
- **Representation of the People Act, 1951:** Governs the procedures for conducting elections.

Judicial Interpretation:

- **N.P. Ponnuswami v. Returning Officer (1952):** Declared the Right to Vote as a **statutory right**.
- **Jyoti Basu v. Debi Ghosal (1982):** Reiterated that the Right to Vote is neither a **fundamental right** nor a common law right.
- **People's Union for Civil Liberties v. Union of India (2003):** Recognised the Right to Vote as at least a **constitutional right**.
- **Kuldip Nayar v. Union of India (2006):** Held that the Right to Vote continues to be a **statutory right**.
- **Raj Bala v. State of Haryana (2015):** Recognised the Right to Vote as a **constitutional right**.
- **Anoop Baranwal v. Union of India (2023):**
 - **Majority View:** Right to Vote is a **statutory right**.
 - **Dissenting Opinion by Justice Ajay Rastogi:**
 - Linked the Right to Vote with the freedom of speech and expression under Article 19(1)(a).
 - Considered it essential to free and fair elections and thus part of the basic structure of the Constitution.

India's first Genomic Atlas reveals deep Ancestry and Health Risks



Why in the News?

A landmark study published in the 'Cell' journal has sequenced the genomes of 2,762 Indians from 23 states and union territories, creating the most comprehensive genomic map of India to date.

About the Genomic Atlas:



- **Overview:** Caste, tribe, language, geography, and urban-rural differences are all covered in the most thorough genetic mapping of Indian populations, which is the Genomic Atlas.
- **Cooperation:** It was carried out by both Indian and foreign organizations with the goal of comprehending how Indian genomes were shaped by historical migrations and societal systems.
- **Utilization of Molecular Clocks:** To track the evolutionary history of various Indian populations and determine human lineage,

researchers employed genetic mutations as molecular clocks.

- **Emphasis on Ancestry and Disease:** The research looks at interbreeding with Neanderthals and Denisovans, as well as recessive disorders and mutations connected to disease.
- **Range:** Plans aim for developing technologies to track illness origins within genetically diverse Indian populations and extending coverage to more remote places.
- **Impact on Precision Medicine:** By integrating Indian genetic variety into international medical research, it seeks to enhance individualized treatment.

Key Highlights of the Study:

- **Finding of New Gene Variants:** More than 2.6 crore genetic variants that had not been previously identified were found; many of these are not included in international gene databases.
- **Indians are largely descended from a single migration out of Africa** approximately 50,000 years ago, rather than from earlier human populations.
- **Three major ancestral components:**
 - **Ancient Ancestral South Indians (AASI)** – early hunter-gatherers.
 - **Iranian-related Neolithic farmers** – from Sarazm (~4th millennium BCE).
 - **Eurasian Steppe pastoralists** – arrived around **2000 BCE**, tied to **Indo-European languages**.
- **Additional East Asian ancestry:** Presumably post-Gupta or connected to rice cultivation (~520 CE), found in East, Northeast, and certain Central Indian groups (e.g., 5% in West Bengal).
- **Effects of caste endogamy:** High homozygosity brought on by prolonged inbreeding within castes increases the incidence of recessive genetic disorders.

- Archaic DNA: Neanderthal and Denisovan segments are abundant in Indian genomes, particularly in immune-related genes such as TRIM, BTNL2, and MHC.
- Particular health risks: 7% of identified protein-altering variations are associated with severe genetic diseases; a BCHE variant associated with an anesthetic response is abundant in Telangana.
- Extreme interrelatedness and severe founder effects were shown by the fact that every individual had at least one genetic relative in the sample, especially in South India.
- Unrivaled Neanderthal diversity: Of all the populations worldwide, India has the greatest diversity of genetic pieces originating from Neanderthals.

New flowering plant named after Nyishi Tribe



Why in the News?

A new species of flowering plant, *Begonia nyishiorum*, has been discovered in the East Kameng district of Arunachal Pradesh.

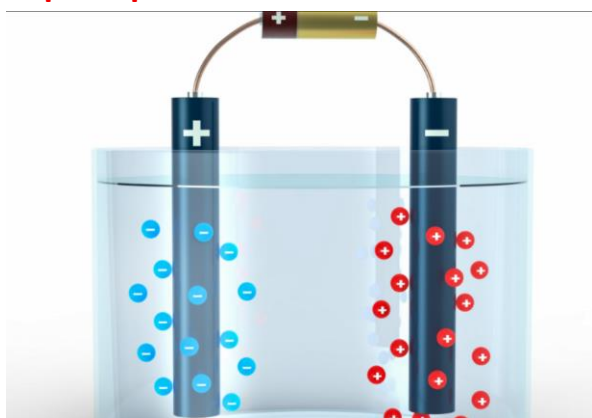
About *Begonia nyishiorum*:

- Overview: *Begonia nyishiorum* is an endemic flowering plant that was recently discovered in East Kameng, Arunachal Pradesh.
- Scientific Recognition: The Missouri Botanical Garden's peer-reviewed journal *Novon* released an official description of it in June 2025.
- A characteristic that sets this species apart from other Asian begonias is its crimson, fringed scales (indumentum) on light green petioles.
- Range and Habitat: It grows best on damp, shady mountain slopes between 1,500 and 3,000 meters above sea level.
- Ecological Sensitivity: The plant is possibly fragile and needs conservation care, as it is only known from two forest locales.
- Origin of Name: The Nyishi tribe, who is renowned for their ecological stewardship of nearby woodlands, is honored by the species name *nyishiorum*.

About the Nyishi Tribe:

- Overview: With a population of over 300,000, the Nyishi are the largest ethnic community in Arunachal Pradesh.
- Name Meaning: In their language, the term "Nyishi" denotes a civilized human being by combining the words "Nyi" (man) and "Shi" (being).
- Linguistic Identity: Although its origins are still up for question, their language is a member of the Sino-Tibetan family.
- Geographic Distribution: They inhabit portions of Assam and eight districts in Arunachal Pradesh, including East Kameng, Papum Pare, and Kurung Kumey.
- Livelihood Practices: They make a living via hunting, fishing, slash-and-burn farming, and handicrafts including weaving and bamboo work.
- Key Festivals: They commemorate Longte (April) for protection from evil, Nyokum (February) for prosperity, and Boori-Boot (February) for unity.
- Social Structure: There is no strict social hierarchy or caste system in Nyishi society, which is patrilineal and clan-based.
- Women's role: Marriages entail reciprocal family trades that strengthen community relationships, and women are viewed as symbols of peace and prosperity.

Indian Scientists created high-performance Supercapacitor Material



Why in the News?

Scientists from Bengaluru, in collaboration with Aligarh Muslim University, have developed an advanced material that significantly improves supercapacitor performance.

What are Supercapacitors?

- **Energy Devices for Fast Charging:** Supercapacitors are unique devices that store and release energy far more quickly than conventional batteries.
- **Utilized in Contemporary Technology:** They are present in solar systems, electric cars, and phones where quick energy supply is required.
- **Storage Trade-off:** They typically store less energy than conventional batteries, despite charging more quickly.
- **Continuous Scientific Work:** Scientists are working to boost energy capacity without compromising their rapid charging capabilities.

About Lanthanum-Doped Silver Niobate:

- **New Material from Indian Scientists:** A research team from Aligarh Muslim University and Bengaluru developed an improved supercapacitor material.
- **The foundation substance they employed was silver niobate,** which is environmentally benign and non-toxic.
- **Improved by Lanthanum Doping:** They used a technique known as doping to add the rare metal

lanthanum to aid improve electrical performance.

- **Bigger Surface, Smaller Particles:** As the particles shrank in size, the surface area available for storing energy increased.

What makes this material special?

- **Better with Use:** After several uses, the material maintained 118% of its capacity, indicating that it got better with time.
- **100% Energy Efficiency:** It was extremely efficient because no energy was wasted during charging or discharging.
- **Fast and Smooth Performance:** Compared to earlier materials, it provided energy more quickly and steadily.
- **Verified in a Real-World Test:** This material has practical applications as it might power an LCD screen in a test instrument.
- **Eco-Friendly Option:** It is environmentally friendly and devoid of lead.
- **Future Prospects:** Researchers intend to scale up this process for commercial usage in electronics, electric vehicles, and solar technology, as well as apply it to other materials.

Biomarkers of Healthy Aging, Resilience, Adversity, and Transitions (BHARAT)



Why in the News?

IISc Bengaluru has launched BHARAT (Biomarkers of Healthy Aging, Resilience, Adversity, and Transitions), a pioneering study exploring the biology, lifestyle, and environment behind Aging.

About the BHARAT Project:



- **Scientific Launch:** The Indian Institute of Science (IISc), Bengaluru, is spearheading this national research project.
- Its main objective is to provide India's first scientific baseline on the biological, environmental, and social aging of Indians.
- **Project Leadership:** Professor DK Saini of the Department of Development Biology and Genetics at IISc is in charge of the project.
- **Addressing Global Gaps:** Unlike the majority of global ageing studies that rely on Western populations, it provides data particular to India, so addressing a significant research hole.
- **Redefining Normal:** It will question global health norms (such as those for vitamin D and cholesterol) that can incorrectly categorize Indian health metrics.
- **Focus on Biological Age:** To detect illness risk early, the initiative will investigate indicators of biological aging rather than chronological age.

Key Features of the Project:

- **India-Centric Baseline:** Reference biomarker cut-offs specific to Indian genetics, nutrition, and lifestyle will be provided by the database.
- **Broad Range of Biomarkers:** It will use environmental, metabolic, and genetic markers to identify organ aging and resilience at an early stage.
- **AI-Driven Analysis:** To identify aging trends, model medical interventions, and predict hazards, machine learning methods will be employed.

- **Holistic Ageing Model:** The study will look at how Indians age in relation to social, environmental, and nutritional aspects.
- **Equity for Global South:** It uses locally validated health data to rectify global biases that incorrectly label Indians as deficient.
- **Focus on Healthspan:** Rather than merely increasing life years, the focus is on quality of life, or living healthier for longer.

What is SAKSHAM-3000?

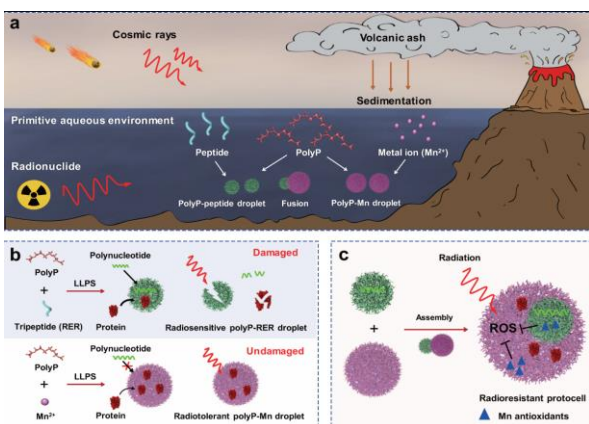
- **Overview:** The Centre for Development of Telematics (C-DOT) created this high-speed switch-cum-router to bolster India's digital infrastructure.
- **Native Operating System:** CROS (C-DOT Router Operating System), which powers the device, allows for safe, scalable, and modular network operations.
- **Next-Gen Capability:** With a throughput of up to 25.6 Terabits per second (Tbps), it is built for incredibly quick data transfer.
- **Use cases include** hyperscale computing clusters, 5G/6G networks, data centers, and AI systems.

- **Cloud and Telecom Ready:** It concurrently supports old protocols, cloud-native installations, and next network architectures.

Technical Highlights and Capabilities:

- **Massive Throughput:** It can give a full 25.6 Tbps capacity and supports 32 400G Ethernet connections at speeds ranging from 1G to 400G.
- **Wire-Speed Performance:** Real-time transmission without bottlenecks is ensured by processing data packets at line rate.

How Heat led to Protocells formation on Earth?



Why in the News?

A new Nature Physics study suggests that warm volcanic rock surfaces may have concentrated organic molecules

in watery cracks, triggering life-like chemistry—offering a clue to how protocells formed without membranes before life began.

What are Protocells?

- **Overview:** Protocells are thought to be the earliest examples of actual biological cells. They are simple bubbles that resemble cells. Despite not being totally living, they provide a setting for the first chemical reactions.
- **Lack of Complexity:** These structures were able to hold significant molecules like RNA and amino acids together while lacking complicated components like organelles or DNA systems.
- **Membrane Role:** Protocells frequently created basic membranes or borders that made it easier for molecules to interact and stay enclosed, facilitating the initiation of early processes like protein production.
- **Importance:** Despite not being living, they provided a framework for the evolution of fundamental chemistry into biology, bridging the gap between systems that are not living and those that are.

History of Formation of Protocells:

- **Early Earth Conditions:** Warm water pools and volcanic fissures containing organic molecules created by lightning and other natural processes were present on the Earth's surface more than 3.5 billion years ago.
- **Compartmentalization:** The concept of bubble-like protocells originated from the belief that life began with the concentration of beneficial molecules in one location so they could begin to react.
- **Old Theories:** Oparin and Haldane postulated in the 1920s that life originated in the early Earth's oceans as a "primordial soup" containing spontaneous chemical reactions.
- **Current Understanding:** According to more recent studies, protocells were formed without the use of intricate membranes thanks to temperature gradients and water flows

produced by hydrothermal vents or fissures in volcanic rock.

Key Findings in the 2025 Study:

- **Lab Setup:** To simulate early Earth rock fissures, scientists constructed a 170-micrometer chamber with a warm top (40°C) and a cool bottom (27°C).
- **DNA Test:** A protein-making kit (PURExpress) and DNA were introduced. Green fluorescent protein (GFP) was only produced by the DNA in the warm-cool environment, demonstrating actual protein synthesis.
- **Molecule Collection:** Vital components such as phosphate ions, magnesium, and DNA accumulated more near the bottom, up to 70 times more concentrated than at the top.
- **Cell-Like Behavior:** The technology mimicked actual cell selectivity by allowing trash to escape while keeping beneficial molecules inside even in the absence of a membrane.
- **Big Implication:** Long before complete cells emerged, this experiment suggests that life may begin in simple natural settings with only heat, flow, and basic chemicals.

Vera C Rubin Observatory**Why in the News?**

The Vera C. Rubin Observatory has recently begun a 10-year project to study dark matter and dark energy using a 3,200-megapixel camera (of the Simonyi Survey Telescope) from its site in the Chilean Andes.

**About Vera C. Rubin Observatory:**

- **Location:** The Vera C. Rubin Observatory is located 8,684 feet above sea level atop Cerro Pachón in the Chilean Andes.
- It bears the name of Vera C. Rubin, an astronomer who in the 1970s presented strong observational proof of dark matter's existence.
- **study Duration:** The observatory will continuously study the entire southern sky for ten years.
- **Data Volume:** Every night, it is intended to gather about 20 terabytes of astronomical data.
- **Observation System:** Rather than employing manual scheduling, the telescope uses an automated scripting system to choose observation targets on the fly.
- Understanding how galaxies originate, finding a potential ninth planet, spotting potentially dangerous asteroids, and researching the nature of dark matter and dark energy are some of its main objectives.

Key Features:

- **Telescope Design:** The Simonyi Survey Telescope, which has a three-mirror optical system for wide-field imaging, is used at the observatory.
- **What is its size?** Its field of view is 9.6 square degrees (as opposed to Hubble's 0.04 square degrees and James Webb's 0.11 square degrees), and its camera has 3,200 megapixels (as opposed to Hubble's about 1.0 MP).

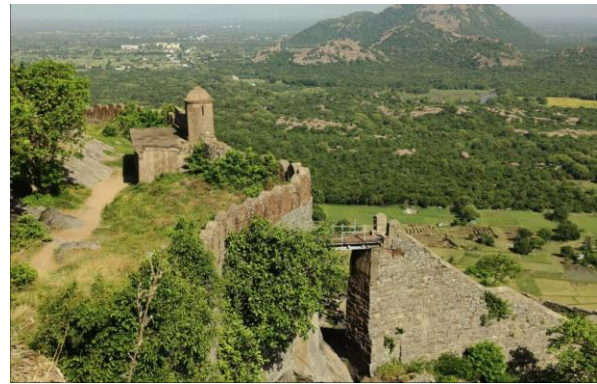
- **Field of View:** Unlike conventional space telescopes, it can record a field of view that is equal to 40 full Moons in a single exposure.
- **Spectral Filters:** Six optical filters built into the camera allow it to record information from the ultraviolet and infrared portions of the electromagnetic spectrum.
- **Slewing Speed:** With the ability to stabilize and reposition in as little as five seconds, the telescope is the fastest-moving big telescope.
- **Imaging Frequency:** It can scan the entire sky every three nights, taking up to 1,000 pictures per night.
- **Change Detection:** Up to 10 million warnings for fleeting astronomical occurrences are sent out every night by its automatic software, which compares recent and historical photos to identify changes.

Breakthrough Discoveries:

- **First Light:** On June 23, 2025, the observatory published its first test photos.
- **Initial Findings:** It found 2,104 new asteroids, including 7 near-Earth objects (NEOs), in just 10 hours after gathering engineering data.
- **Anticipated Findings:** It is anticipated to find more than 5 million asteroids and about 100,000 NEOs during the course of the 10-year mission.
- **Impact on Database:** The present global inventory of known asteroids would be tripled as a result of these results.
- **Universe Mapping:** The observatory will create the most comprehensive map of the universe's large-scale structure to date.
- **Analysis of Dark Matter:** Dark matter, which makes up 27% of the universe's composition, will be supported by the findings.
- **Study of Dark Energy:** It will also aid researchers in comprehending the forces that propel cosmic expansion and comprise 68% of the cosmos.
- **Context of Visible Matter:** Since visible matter makes up just 5% of the cosmos, data from the

observatory is crucial for understanding the other 95%.

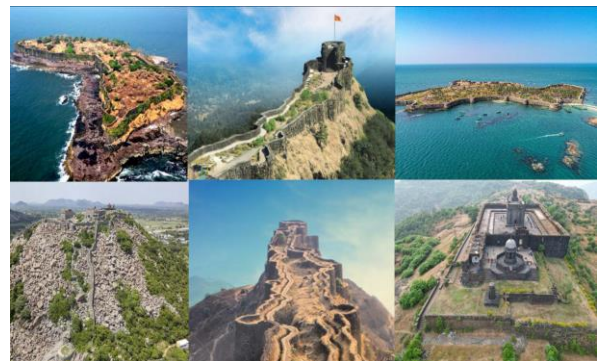

About Maratha Military Landscapes:



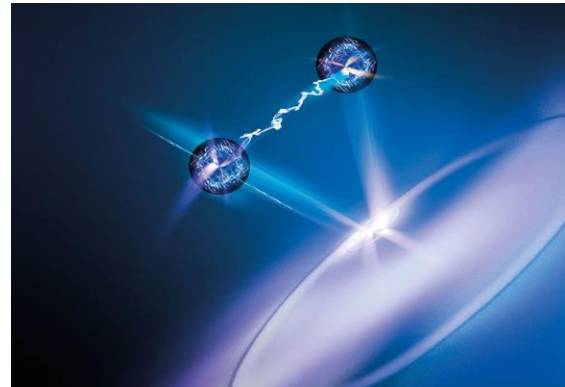
- **Overview:** A network of 12 forts showcasing the Maratha Empire's military architecture and strategic fortification from the 17th to 19th centuries.
- **Time Period:** Developed between 1670 CE (Shivaji's era) and 1818 CE (end of Peshwa rule).
- **Geographical Spread:** 11 forts in Maharashtra and 1 in Tamil Nadu (Gingee Fort), covering hill, coastal, forest, plateau, and island terrains.
- **Key Forts:** Salher, Shivneri, Lohgad, Raigad, Rajgad, Pratapgad, Khanderi, Suvarnadurg, Panhala, Vijaydurg, Sindhudurg (Maharashtra); Gingee (Tamil Nadu).

What are UNESCO World Heritage Sites?

 - **India** formally **signed** the Convention on November 14, **1977**.
- Sites are selected by the **World Heritage Committee**, comprising 21 elected state parties.
- Categories include:
 - **Cultural** (e.g., forts, temples, cities)
 - **Natural** (e.g., forests, parks, biodiversity sites)
 - **Mixed** (having both cultural and natural value)
- Selection is based on **10 criteria** (6 cultural + 4 natural); at least one must be met.
- Once inscribed, sites are eligible for **global recognition, protection, and funding**.

Breakthrough in Quantum Noise Research



Why in the News?

Researchers at the Raman Research Institute (RRI) found that quantum noise—usually seen as a problem—can sometimes help connect particles in a special way called entanglement, which is important for future quantum technologies.

What is Quantum Noise?



- Overview: Random disturbances that impact quantum systems and frequently result in loss of coherence or decoherence are referred to as quantum noise.
- Conventional View: It is generally seen as detrimental, particularly with regard to quantum entanglement, which is essential for quantum communication and computing.
- The concept of entanglement describes a situation in which particles are so closely coupled to one another that, even when they are far apart, their states are immediately impacted.
- Decoherence's Effect: This entanglement is broken by noise-induced decoherence, which lowers the effectiveness of quantum technology.

Key Findings:

- **Observation:** Despite its usual reputation as destructive, it was discovered that quantum noise can create or restore entanglement.
- **Area of Focus:** investigated intraparticle entanglement, which deals with a single particle's internal characteristics (such as spin and route).
- **Contrast with Interparticle Entanglement:** Intraparticle entanglement demonstrated stability under noise, in contrast to interparticle entanglement (between distinct particles).
- **Types of Noise Studied:**
 - **Amplitude Damping:** Energy loss
 - **Phase Damping:** Loss of phase information
 - **Depolarizing Noise:** Random changes in quantum state
- **Important Finding:** Intraparticle entanglement exhibited delayed decay, revival, and even formation from unentangled states under amplitude damping.
- **Interparticle Comparison:** On the other hand, there was no revival or generation and interparticle entanglement showed a gradual decrease.

Scientific Implications:

- **New Perspective:** Shows that quantum noise can be useful in some situations, challenging the notion that it is always bad.
- **Technological Potential:** Intraparticle entanglement is useful for stable quantum devices since it is more noise-resistant.
- **Application Areas:** The results have implications for quantum sensing, quantum computation, quantum communication, and QKD (quantum key distribution).
- **Predictive Advantage:** By accurately predicting entanglement behavior, the new formula facilitates the design of resilient systems.

- **Platform Independence:** The findings apply to photons, neutrons, trapped ions, and other particles regardless of the platform.

Gujarat's Tribal Genome Sequencing Project

**Why in the News?**

Gujarat has launched India's first Tribal Genome Sequencing Project to map tribal genetic data, contributing to the national Genome India Project (GIP).

About the Gujarat Tribal Genome Project:

- **Launch and Duration:** Five years under the Gujarat Biotechnology Research Centre (GBRC); announced in Gujarat's 2025–2026 budget.
- **Target Population:** Concentrates on the sequencing of the genomes of tribal people, which make up around 15% of Gujarat's population (about 1 crore).
- **Goal:** Resolves underrepresentation in the Genome India Project (GIP), which included only about 100 Gujarati tribal samples.
- **Sample Size:** 2,000-sample reference genome panel comprising 4,158 individuals, including 378 triple families.

- Information about blood, feces, genealogy, physiology, and lifestyle is collected.

Key Features:

- **Precision Medicine Applications**
 - **Early Detection:** Enables screening for **sickle cell anaemia**, G6PD deficiency, BRCA-linked cancers.
 - **Gene-Trait Mapping:** Explores genetic links to traits like agility and archery.
- **Genomic Sampling Protocol**
 - **Filtering:** Uses SNP genotyping to remove closely related samples.
 - **Sequencing:** Conducts **Whole Genome Sequencing (WGS)** on **2,000 diverse samples** via Illumina NovaSeq 6000.

India has advanced its indigenous naval capabilities with the induction of INS Udaygiri, the second stealth frigate built under Project 17A.



About INS Udaygiri:

- **Overview:** It represents a significant turning point in India's domestic naval capability as the second stealth frigate produced under Project 17A.

- **Legacy Name:** In honor of the decommissioned Leander-class frigate INS Udaygiri (F35), which was in service from 1976 until 2007.
- **Construction:** Mazagon Dock Shipbuilders Ltd. (MDL) made one of the project's quickest deliveries on July 1, 2025, just 37 months after it was launched.
- **Indigenous Technology:** Displays domestic defense production with its in-house sensors and combat systems.
- **MSME Contribution:** In keeping with the Aatmanirbhar Bharat goal, more than 200 Indian MSMEs took part in the construction process.
- **Combat Features:**
 - **Blue-Water Capable:** Built for long-range operations, it can project Indian strength into far-off waters and confront both conventional and asymmetric threats.
 - **Features that make it difficult to detect** include a low-infrared signature and materials that absorb radar.
 - **Arsenal:** Outfitted with a 76 mm main gun, medium-range SAMs, supersonic surface-to-surface missiles, and CIWS (30 mm and 12.7 mm).
 - **Efficient Propulsion:** For speed and efficiency, a combined diesel and gas (CODAG) propulsion system is used.

What is Project 17A?

- **Overview:** Project 17 (Shivalik-class) will be replaced in 2019 by the Indian Navy's effort to construct seven stealth guided-missile frigates.
- **Shipbuilders Taking Part:** Under the Navy's Warship Design Bureau (WDB), MDL (Mumbai) and GRSE (Kolkata) share construction.
- **Ships with modern designs** have modular weapon systems, stealth hulls, and lower infrared signatures.
- **Launches and Timeline:** All ships are expected to be delivered by 2026, with the first frigate, INS Nilgiri, being launched in 2019.

- Upgrades in technology include electronic warfare systems, sophisticated radar, more automation, and increased survivability.
- **Indigenous Content:** Project 17A supports the Make in India defense policy by emphasizing domestic components.
- **Multi-Role Capabilities:** Ideal for high-threat situations, these weapons are made for anti-air, anti-surface, and anti-submarine warfare.

Successful trial of Akash Prime Air Defence System



Why in the News?

India successfully tested the Akash Prime Missile System in Ladakh, neutralizing two high-speed aerial targets at high altitude.

About Akash Prime:

- **What It Is:** Akash Prime is an upgraded version of the **Akash Surface-to-Air Missile (SAM) system**.
- **High-Altitude Capability:** Designed to operate effectively **above 4,500 metres**.
- **Development:** Developed by **DRDO** with **BDL**, **BEL**, and **Army Air Defence**.
- **Operational Use:** Proven in **Operation Sindoor** against aerial threats.
- **Production Trials:** Validated through First of Production Model (FoPM) firing trials.
- **Deployment:** Already in use at IAF bases and forward posts along the LAC in Ladakh.

Key Features:

- **Seeker Upgrade:** Equipped with an **indigenous active Radio Frequency (RF) seeker** for better accuracy.
- **Altitude Adaptability:** Engineered for **high-altitude, cold-climate** operations.
- **Multi-Target Engagement:** Capable of engaging multiple aerial threats at once.
- **Speed & Accuracy:** Travels at **Mach 2.5** with up to **90% kill probability**.
- **Electronic Warfare:** Equipped with ECCM features to resist electronic jamming.
- **Radar Integration:** Uses **Rajendra radar** for detection, targeting, and tracking.

Other Variants of Akash:

- **Akash Mark-I (1990–2005):** First version under IGMDP; achieved successful dual-target intercepts by 2005.
- **Akash-15 (2019):** Enhanced version with 30 km range and 60 kg warhead; effective against aircraft and drones; tested successfully in May 2019.
- **Akash Prime (2021 onwards):** Added active RF seeker and altitude/weather resistance; tested on September 27, 2021.
- **Akash-NG (Next Generation):** Approved in 2016 with ₹470 crore funding; offers faster response and improved aerial threat protection.

Indian Navy commissioned INS Nistar, the country's first indigenously designed and constructed Diving Support Vessel (DSV).

About INS Nistar:



- **Project Origin:** First of two Diving Support Vessels (DSVs) ordered by the Navy in **2018**.
- **Developer:** Built by **Hindustan Shipyard Ltd** with input from 120 Indian MSMEs.
- **Commissioning:** Inducted at Naval Dockyard, Visakhapatnam.
- **Legacy Name:** Named after the **Soviet-origin INS Nistar (1971–1989)**.
- **Indigenization:** Over **80% indigenous content**, in line with Aatmanirbhar Bharat.
- **Sister Ship:** INS Nipun, launched in **2022**, will join soon.

Key Features:

- **Rescue Depth:** Supports diving and submarine rescue operations up to **300 metres**.
- **Rescue Equipment:** Equipped with **ROVs, Hyperbaric Lifeboats**, and Diving Chambers.
- **DSRV Role:** Functions as **mothership** for Deep Submergence Rescue Vehicles.
- **Size:** 120 metres long with a **displacement of ~10,500 tonnes**.
- **Endurance:** Can stay at sea for over **60 days**.
- **Utility Gear:** Fitted with a **15-tonne subsea crane** and helipad facilities.
- **Medical Support:** Includes OT, ICU, hospital beds, and hyperbaric treatment units.

What are Autonomous District Councils (ADC)?



Why in the News?

Mizoram Governor has imposed Governor's Rule in the Chakma Autonomous District Council (CADC) due to prolonged political instability and repeated leadership changes.

About Autonomous District Councils (ADCs):

- **Basis:** Founded in accordance with the Sixth Schedule of the Indian Constitution, these are local self-governing organizations.
- **Coverage:** In the northeastern states of Assam, Meghalaya, Tripura, and Mizoram (ATM2), ADCs are established in tribal areas.
- **The goal** of these councils is to give tribal communities the independence they need to manage their own issues and maintain their culture and traditions.
- **Notification:** Every tribal region designated as an independent district under the Sixth Schedule is overseen by its own ADC.
- **Goal:** Protecting tribal identity and rights, ensuring local development, and advancing

tribal self-governance are the main goals of ADCs.

Key Features of ADCs

- **Legal Status:** ADCs are not subject to state law because they are established by constitutional provisions included in the Sixth Schedule.
- Each ADC has a maximum of 30 members, of whom 4 are nominated by the governor and 26 are chosen by adult suffrage.
- **Tenure:** An ADC has a five-year term from the date of its formation.
- **Authority Scope:** To meet the requirements of indigenous communities, ADCs have limited judicial, executive, and legislative authority.
- **Law Applicability:** Unless specifically extended by the governor, state and federal laws do not always apply in ADC regions.

Powers and Functions of ADCs:

- **Lawmaking Authority:** ADCs have the authority to pass legislation pertaining to agriculture, land management, and forest usage (reserved forests excepted).
- **Customary Regulations:** They have the authority to designate traditional chiefs and headmen and to control social traditions, marriage, divorce, and inheritance.
- **Local Administration:** It is in charge of roads, markets, fisheries, dispensaries, and elementary education.
- **Village courts** may be established by councils to consider civil and criminal matters involving tribal members and to impose sentences of up to five years.

- Trade Regulation: With the governor's consent, they have the authority to control non-tribals' money lending and trading.
- Taxes on occupations, trades, ferries, automobiles, marketplaces, and public infrastructure such as roads and schools are among its sources of income.

Autonomy and Limitations:

- Degree of Autonomy: Within their territorial jurisdiction, ADCs have a great deal of legislative and administrative autonomy.
- Non-Applicability of General legislation: To ensure self-rule, state and parliamentary

legislation only take effect when instructed by the governor.

- Governor's Oversight: In spite of autonomy, the governor has the authority to adopt, amend, or revoke council decisions.
- Financial Restraints: ADCs frequently generate little income, which limits how effectively they can develop.
- Administrative Challenges: Instability in leadership, a lack of skilled staff, and state meddling in council operations are examples of operational problems.





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
